MINUTES OF THE STATE BOARD OF TECHNICAL REGISTRATION March 16, 17, 1967

The meeting of the State Board of Technical Registration was called to order by Mr. John Girand, Chairman, in the Banquet Room of the Holiday Inn, Tucson, Arizona, at 10:10 A.M., March 16, 1967.

It was moved by Mr. Scholer and seconded by Mr. Goodwin that the minutes of the meeting of the Board on December 1 and 2, 1966, be approved as presented. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Marum that the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting, held December 10, 1967, at the Francisco Grande Hotel, in Casa Grande, be approved as presented. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE RULES AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

ABSENT

Mr. Dryden reported on the progress of the Rules and By-Laws Committee since the Casa Grande meeting of December 10th and the study being prepared by Mr. Feldman, Mr. Feldman presented two copies of his study to each of the members suggesting that they study the report and prepare comments, remarks and desires regarding a more comprehensive review and proposed improvements of the Code, Rules and By-Laws. After receipt of the comments of the individual members, the committee will make a final report at the next meeting. Mr. Dryden suggested that a combined meeting of the Rules and By-Laws and Legislative Committee was in order before the final report. It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Marum that the interim report and study by Mr. Feldman be accepted. Motion carried.

Mr. Dryden and Dean Coleman reported to the Board on requests of a change to Rule I, GENERAL RULES, A.2 which suggests the adding of a Geophysical Engineering category. It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Scholer that necessary action be taken advertising the proposed Rule change to add Geophysical Engineering after a formal hearing at the June meeting of the Board. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Mr. Goodwin reported on the interim studies of possible legislation and reported the continued assurance by the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers of their interest in the affairs of the Board and their desire to work with the Board.

Mr. Girand reported on the Ad-Hoc Committee of the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers and the Board of Technical Registration concerning legislative and other matters, and announced that he had appointed Mr. Kemper Goodwin and Mr. C. W. Dryden to be the Board's members on this Ad-Hoc Committee. It was moved by Dean Coleman and seconded by Mr. Feldman that the reports of Mr. Goodwin and Mr. Girand and the appointments of Mr. Goodwin and Mr. Dryden to the Ad-Hoc Committee be accepted. Motion carried.

The Chairman opened discussion on the new conflict of interest laws and rulings questioning whether a member of this Board who operates as an engineer doing consulting work for other State agencies would be technically involved. It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Dean Coleman that an opinion be obtained from the Attorney General's office questioning if members of this Board who act as a consultant to the other State agencies would be in violation of other Statutes. Motion carried.

Mr. Allison C. Dow, State President of the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers, accompanied by Mr. Richard Guthrie of the Central Chapter; Mr. Bill Ferguson of the Cochise Chapter; and Messrs. Larry McKinney, Louis Fiscel, E. D. Herreras and Ed Smith of the Southern Chapter, appeared before the Board at 2:00 P.M., Thursday, March 16th, as previously scheduled. Mr. Dow read the following letter to the Board, Minute Page 1991, and an informal discussion followed. Mr. Guthrie then reported to the Board on the first meeting of the Ad-Hoc Committee, as temporary chairman, indicating that the next meeting was scheduled for March 23rd. Discussions of mutual interest by the groups continued until 3:00 P.M. and the Chairman thanked all present for their attendance and interest, assuring them that harmonious relationships between them and the Board on the matters discussed would be continued.

REPORT OF THE EXAMINATION COMMITTEE

Letter of request by Wesley G. Nelson, architectural applicant, requesting review of his Architectural Design examination for December, 1966, was presented. The Architectural Committee reported that a review of this examination indicated no change in his grade was recommended. It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Dean Coleman that the report on Mr. Nelson be accepted and he be so notified. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Scholer that the architectural examination grades as presented on Minute Pages 1992, 1993 and 1994 be accepted. Motion carried.

The Engineering Examination Committee reported on requests for re-review of Examination, Part 4, Civil Engineering, by John C. Pape, Robert C. Potts and Carroll G. Tablert, and that the re-review of these examinations indicated a passing grade should be assigned to each man on the questioned portion. It was moved by Dean Coleman and seconded by Mr. Dryden that the report of the Examination Committee, reflecting passing grades for Messrs. Pape, Potts and Talbert be confirmed and the individuals so notified. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Dean Coleman that the engineering examination grades, Minute Pages 1995, 1996, 1997, 1998 and 1999, were now ready for certification by the Board and recommended that they be so certified. Motion carried.

It was moved by Dean Coleman and seconded by Mr. Dryden that those applicants who have completed the written examinations be held for the personal audience requirement. Motion carried.

Gentlemen:

As President of the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers, I have been instructed by my State Board to discuss certain matters concerning the granting of Registration Certificates under the current Statutory Requirements which govern your Board.

As we are not aware of the proper procedure or protocol pertaining to this action I have requested an appearance before you at this meeting.

As has been indicated to this Board earlier, thru contacts and meetings with your chairman and the ASPE Registration Committee, The Arizona Society of Professional Engineers is deeply concerned with the current statutory requirements for legal registration in the State of Arizona pertaining to the various technical professions.

ASPE believes that the Public interest primarily, and the Profession's interest secondly, would be best served by commencing at an early date the revision of our Arizona Statute, Section 32 - pertaining to Professional Engineer Registration, in accordance with or as nearly practical to conform with the "Model Law" version as developed by the National Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners, and adopted by the National Society of Professional Engineers.

It is our opinion that an "AD HOC" Committee, as proposed to review the present State Law on Technical Registration, and registration processes, with the goal of setting up Guide Lines for use by the State Board of Technical Registration at their descretion, would be more effective and desireable than a Joint Committee with SBTR and ASPE.

We thank you for the opportunity to appear before the State Board of Technical. Registration and we offer any assistance that our Society of over 700 members can do to help improve the economical and Professional Status of the Engineer.

The Engineering Examination Committee discussed with the Board the proposition of using the National Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners professional examinations as opposed to the continuation of Arizona prepared examinations. It was agreed by those present that the National Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners examination not be used at this time.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC INFORMATION COMMITTEE

Mr. Goodwin reported on the recent Western Conference of State Architectural Registration Boards' Annual Meeting held at Camelback Inn, February 16 - 18, 1967, and that the meeting was well attended. Question was discussed at this meeting, on part, of how the examinations concerning Architectural Design and Site Planning were written. He, also, reported that the National Council is considering that any architectural applicant for registration be a graduate of an accredited architectural school.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Dryden that the engineering members wishing to attend the Western Zone meeting of the National Council of State Boards of Engineering Examiners in Reno, Nevada, on April 28 and 29, 1967, be authorized to do so. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Scholer and seconded by Dean Coleman that the architectural members wishing to attend the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards' Annual Meeting in New York on May 11 - 13, 1967, be authorized to do so. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

Schedules I and II for the proposed budget for 1967-68 and 1968-69 were passed out to the members at the meeting. It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Dean Coleman that the report be accepted as submitted, Minute Page 2001, and that remarks and comments be forwarded to the Budget Committee to facilitate final action at the June meeting. Motion carried.

REPORT OF GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE #1

Discussion on a complaint of ethical practice submitted by L. H. Bell and Associates indicated that this was an area in which the Board has no jurisdiction unless further evidence is produced even though it may be an unethical practice required investigation by a professional society. It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Goodwin that the Board take no action on the reference complaint and so notify L. H. Bell and Associates. Motion carried.

The Budget Committee met on Friday, January 27, 1967, and reviewed all documents and papers submitted by the Executive Secretary regarding the proposed budgets for the fiscal years 1967-68 and 1968-69.

We, of the Papago Chapter, Arizona Society of Professional Engineers, feel that it is vital that the title, "engineer," be reserved for those who are registered professional engineers.



As you know, ASPE has taken great interest of late in all matters pertaining to registration and this particular item brought about the following concerns. The Central Chapter ASPE feels "every effort should be made to fit Geophysical Engineering into one of the present registration classifications". It was felt that one of the following classifications might well be considered: Chemical, Geological, Metallurgical, Mining or Petroleum.

Will you please bring this matter to the attention of the Board at the June 1967 meeting?

"The undersigned requests additions to the General Rules of the Board, as follows:

"Rule I. A. 2. At the end of the paragraph add:

'Registration will be granted also in the branch designated "Consulting": Registration in this branch will be granted automatically by the Board to any engineering registrant who holds a valid registration in any branch, who certifies to a permanent place of business, and who actively maintains in force and effect a professional liability insurance policy in a minimum amount of \$10,000."

Mr. Girand, as Chairman, relinquished the meeting to Mr. Scholer.
Mr. Girand reported that the above proposed Rule change had been sponsored by 48 registrants who felt that the change merited consideration by the Board. It was moved by Mr. Girand and seconded by Mr. Dryden that the Board follow the required procedure to conduct a formal hearing on the proposed change at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Discussion on the motion indicated that the motion should be withdrawn as more information was required before adoption. The motion was then withdrawn.

It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Goodwin that an opinion be secured from the Attorney General on the question as to whether or not the Board can legally adopt such Rule and upon its receipt, and circulation to all the members of the Board, the Chair determine if a special meeting is in order to advertise for the formal hearing. Motion carried.

It was emphasized by Dean Coleman that the petitioners be notified of the action of the Board and that if a formal hearing is to be scheduled, all interested registrants be notified.

Mr. Girand resumed the chair.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

It was reported by Mr. Goodwin that, as instructed by the Board at its March meeting, an opinion was requested from the Attorney General on the following question:

"Would violation of the existing statutes or case law occur where an appointive member of this Board operates as a consulting professional to other State agencies established by law?"

The reply had been received and is included as Minute Pages 2029 and 2030.

Mr. Goodwin, as Chairman of the Legislative Committee, reported on the work of his committee during the intervening months and indicated that a final report would be possibly available at the September meeting of the Board.

DEPARTMENT OF LAW OPINION NO. 67-12 (R-69)

REQUESTED BY:

Walter J. Edelblut, Jr., Executive Secretary

State Board of Technical Registration

OUESTION:

Would a member of the State Board of Technical Registration, acting in his private capacity, violate any existing statutes or case law by entering into contracts with other state

agencies?

ANSWER:

No, provided that the prohibition set forth in A.R.S. § 38-446 is strictly observed.

A.R.S. § 38-446 (A) provides that:

"Members of the Legislature or state, county, city, town or precinct officers shall not be interested directly or indirectly in any contract or in any sale or purchase made by them in their official capacity, or by any body or board of which they are a member." (Emphasis added)

The statute, although requiring strict compliance, addresses itself solely to those instances in which the state officer sits on the Board with which he is dealing. In McCarthy V. State of Arizona, 55 Ariz. 328, 101 P.2d 449 (1940) the court said:

"...disqualifications provided by the Legislature are construed strictly and will not be extended to cases not clearly within their scope, and the rule is also that there is a presumption in favor of the eligibility of one who has been elected or appointed to public office."

Opinion No. 67-12 (R-69) May 8, 1967 Page Two

Therefore, properly construed, A.R.S. § 38-446 (A) applies only when the Board member is interested in some matter to be acted upon by the Board of which he is a member, and does not prohibit his having a private interest in some matter to be acted upon by another Board or agency. See State v. Bohannon, 101 Ariz. 520, 421 P.2d 877 (1967).

Indeed, barring activities of the type specifically prohibited by A.R.S. § 38-446, it is the public policy of Arizona that, "...public officers and employees shall not be denied the opportunity, available to all other citizens, to acquire and retain private economic and other interests...". A.R.S. new § 13-281 (1) (B).

Consequently, it is the opinion of this office that a member of the State Board of Technical Registration may enter into contracts, in a private capacity, with other state agencies without violating any existing statutes or case law.

I attaching herewith the grade distribution curves on the majority of the examinations which have been graded to date. The fundamentals examination curve shows that the applicants made better grades this time than last year and you will note that only about 24% of the applicants made grades less than 70; therefore, you may find that for your state no adjustment of the grades is necessary. The distribution of grades by deciles is shown below for your state.

for those using the second day examinations, the distribution of grades is shown by major fields. Most of these came out with a good distribution curve and all except electrical were fairly close together. The curves represent the number of papers as shown in the lower part of the chart. A total of 650 papers is reported on these charts. Some adjustment will be necessary, particularly for the electrical examination which apparently was much more difficult than the other branches.

We trust that this will be of assistance to you in establishing final grades for the examinations. Sometime in the near future we will send the request for a summary of these final grades so that this information can be distributed to all of the State Boards without any identification of the individual State Boards being made. Your cooperation and assistance will be greatly appreciated.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Dryden that the certificate of registration of Louis Leslie Coon, Architect, No. 5007, suspended after a formal hearing before the Board on June 22, 1967, be reinstated this date. It was moved by Dean Coleman and seconded by Mr. Eyring that the minutes of the meeting of the Board on June 22nd and 23rd, 1967, be approved as presented. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Vanlandingham and seconded by Mr. Goodwin that the telephone meeting of the Board on July 31, 1967, on Coons and Chonis, be approved as presented. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

There being no committee meetings between regular Board meetings, no report was submitted.

REPORT OF THE RULES AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

As established in the By-Laws, Section 1 (4), the election of new officers, must be held at this meeting.

It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Newlin that the election of officers for the 1967-1968 year be the next order of business. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Dean Coleman that Mr. M. L. Vanlandingham be elected Chairman. Motion carried unanimously.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Eyring that Mr. N. R. Feldman be elected Vice-Chairman. Motion carried unanimously.

It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Newlin that the election of Mr. Carl T. Eyring, as Secretary of the Board, on June 22, 1967, and tabled at that meeting, be taken from the table and made effective. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Dryden reported on ARS 32-125.B., Seals for Registrants, and Rule IV (2) Use of Seals, which was prompted by a discussion during the personal audience of an applicant for professional registration as an Assayer. Mr. Girand made a short statement concerning the Rules and By-Laws, amplifying Mr. Dryden's report. Mr. Dryden passed out sample reports of assaying and laboratory tests, indicating that these reports were accepted for usage without the seal of the registered Assayer, and that clarification of the Statutes and Rules was required. It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Dean Coleman that an opinion be secured from the Attorney General clarifying the above Statute and Rules, specifically, where it concerns Assayers. Motion carried.

Mr. Goodwin observed that the Rules are based upon the Laws as now written. Meetings between the Committee of this Board and Arizona Society of Professional Engineers are reported under Legislative Committee and these require the attention of the members of this Board if changes are proposed.

Mr. Girand stated that other states do and this State should, in a law change consideration, recognize the difference between professional engineers employed by others and professional engineers acting as Consultants, because of the financial liability and responsibility of the Consultants.

The opinion from the Attorney General regarding proposed Rule change, requested at the June meeting of the Board on the clarification of Consulting Engineers, is as per Minute Pages 2055, 2056 and 2057. It was moved by Mr. Eyring and seconded by Mr. Dryden that the opinion be accepted and not action be taken on a hearing for a Rule change. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman reported on a meeting held September 27, 1967, at which the following members were in attendance:

The members reviewed the report made in March by Mr. Feldman, as a member of the Rules and By-Laws Committee. The contents of this report and actions noted by the Board are as follows:

Adopt a title or creed for the Technical Registration Act (Arizona State Board of Technical Registration in order to Safeguard the Public's Health, Welfare, Convenience, Safety, Preserve Life and Prevent Damage adopts these Rules and Regulations).

It was moved by Dean Coleman and seconded by Mr. Girand that this item be referred to the Attorney General's Office for a determination of the Board's authority to adopt such creed. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman reported that as the applicants now certify to the Code of Ethics, as shown on the fly-leaf of our Code, Rules and By-Laws, whether or not this Board should adopt such Code of Ethics as a Rule. It was moved by Mr. Newlin and seconded by Mr. Dryden that consideration of the Code of Ethics as a part of the Rules be subject to an approval by the Attorney General's Office. Motion carried.

It was further reported by Mr. Feldman that the Committee favorably consider that as a part of each application, the applicant be required

This is in reply to your inquiry concerning the propriety of adding "consulting" to the branches of engineering regulated by Rule I(A)(2).

A.R.S. §32-106(b) states:

"The board shall specify on the certificate of registration and annual renewal card issued to each registered engineer the <u>branch</u> of engineering in which he has demonstrated <u>proficiency</u>, and authorize him to use the title of registered professional engineer. The board shall decide what branches of engineering shall be thus recognized." (Emphasis Supplied)

Pursuant to the authority granted to it by this section, the Board enacted Rule I(A)(2), which sets forth the branches of engineering presently recognized by the Board as follows: "aeronautical, agricultural, chemical, civil, electrical, engineering science, geological, geophysical, highway, industrial, mechanical, metallurgical, mining, nuclear, petroleum, sanitary and structural."

It is clear from the foregoing that the statute contemplates and that Rule I(A)(2) has heretofore only dealt with areas of engineering proficiency. A "consulting engineer is understood by this office to mean an engineer in private practice. The term "consulting," then, is an economic rather than an engineering classification and would cut across all branches of engineering proficiency. Because "consulting" clearly is not itself such a branch, it would not be proper to so designate it in Rule I(A)(2). To do so would exceed the authority granted to the Board by §32-106 (B), and there is no specific authority for its inclusion in Rule I(A)(2) under any other section of the Technical Registration Act.

It is well settled that an administrative agency may not, under the guise of rule-making, substitute its judgment for that of the Legislature, and may not exercise its powers to modify or enlarge the provisions of the legislative act which it administers. Certainly, an administrative agency is entirely without the power to enact laws or ordinances. Loftus vs. Russell, 69 Ariz. 245 at 254, 212 P.2d 91; Hernandez vs. Frohmiller, 58 Ariz. 242, 204 P.2d 854 at 862; Harris vs. Alcoholic Beverage Control, Appeals Board, 39 Cal. Rptr. 192 at 195; 73 C.J.S. Public Administrative Bodies and Procedures, §94.

Consequently, it is the opinion of this office that the proposed addition to Rule I(A)(2), because it goes beyond matters of engineering proficiency, would be an exercise of power by the board in excess of that properly delegated to it by the Legislature, and, therefore, would constitute an encroachment upon the powers of the Legislature.

to sign a waiver, properly notarized, authorizing the transmitting of reference material on the applicant and release the Board and said reference from liability in furnishing or securing this information. It was moved by Mr. Feldman and seconded by Mr. Dryden that the Board adopt a suitable waiver form, approved by the Attorney General's Office, and said waiver be made a part of each application for professional registration and be properly signed and notarized by the applicant. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman then reported on publicizing applications to the professional chapters in Arizona and publications. It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Eyring that the Executive Secretary be directed to release such information to the societies and professional publications once a month to facilitate dissemination of applications in process. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman reported that the following Statute changes were favorably considered by the Committee:

- 1. Injunctive privilege.
- 2. Fees
 - a. Architects or P.E. or L.S. \$50.00, plus examination fees to include current year's registration.
 - b. AIT-EIT-GIT, etc. \$10.00, at Board's option.
 - c. Out-of-State comity applications twice resident fees, includes current year's registration.
 - d. Temporary \$150.00 for 3-month period.
 - e. Renewals Architects, P.E., L.S., etc. \$25.00 per year.
 AIT-EIT-GIT none
- 3. Legal hearings on all complaints.
- 4. Twenty-five dollars per diem for members plus actual expenses.

It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Dean Coleman that the above items be referred to the Legislative Committee for consideration and implementation. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman reported that the committee had discussed licenses by the Registrar of Contractors of non-registrants which now may conflict on the Statute of the definition of "engineer." It was moved by Mr. Feldman and seconded by Mr. Vanlandingham that the Executive Secretary and the Assistant Attorney General be directed to negotiate with the Registrar of Contractors regarding the Class A Engineering Licenses which, when issued and having the term engineering in the firm name when registered professional engineers are not authorized officers or partners under ARS 32-141, be, if possible, revised so as not to conflict with ARS 32-101 (6) and (7). Motion carried.

It was further reported by Mr. Feldman that the committee had discussed enforcement of the requirement of seals and signature on all plans and spcifications submitted for permits. This is provided by the present law and was confirmed by an opinion reported later by the Attorney General.

It was moved by Mr. Feldman and seconded by Mr. Eyring that the Executive Secretary review insurance coverage on the Board members, particularly, regarding their acts as members, slander and use of their own vehicles and travel liability under State coverage and report by memo to the Board. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Feldman and seconded by Mr. Eyring that renewals for 1969, and thereafter, registrants be requested to provide the Board with their current employment, association and title. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman reported that in light of legal action in other areas, it would be recommended that if our Code is revised, a statement be made in the Statute that one portion being held unconstitutional would not affect the remainder of the Statute. Mr. Mason said that this was not required as the court would decide whether or not one portion of the Statute was severable from the rest of the Statute.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Feldman that all legislative items be referred to the Legislative Committee for consideration and implementation. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldman further reported that other discussions by the committee were, in effect, a meeting of the Sepcial Office Procedures Committee and would be reported under that item. The Chairman thanked Mr. Feldman for the submittal and discussion of the Committee meeting and that the report was accepted.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Mr. Girand submitted the following report, Minute Page 2060, on the Ad Hoc Committee which has been meeting with the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers. Mr. Goodwin, as Chairman of the Legislative Committee, expanded on Mr. Girand's written report, stating that certain areas of our present laws were under serious consideration by the committee for change and that the areas were:

- 1. Definition and defining practice for Landscape Architects.
- 2. Revisions to the definition of "engineering practice."
- Revisions to the requirements for registration and submittal of application for Grandfather's Clause for Landscape Architects.

Mr. Goodwin further reported on the letter opinion from the Attorney General, No. 67-32-L (R-95), attached as Minute Pages 2061, 2062, 2063 and 2064, which definitely establishes the requirement for State, municipalities, and county officials to uphold the Technical Registration Act.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Vanlandingham that the Executive Secretary transmit to all of the Mayors, City Managers and City Attorneys in Arizona, as well as the County Board of Supervisors, copies of the above opinion, notifying them of the Board's desire that they voluntarily comply. Motion carried.

DEPARTMENT OF LAW LETTER OPINION NO. 67-32-L (R-95)

REQUESTED BY: WALTER J. EDELBLUT, JR., Executive Secretary State Board of Technical Registration

QUESTIONS:

- 1. Are appointed or elected members of a state or municipal board or agency required to swear or affirm when accepting office that they will abide by and uphold the laws of Arizona?
- 2. Can the State Board of Technical Registration itself require other state and municipal boards and agencies to comply with A.R.S. §32-144(4)?

ANSWERS:

- 1. Yes.
- 2. No, but the Board may secure an order from the Superior Court requiring compliance with A.R.S. §32-144(4).
- Are appointed or elected members of a state or municipal board or agency required to swear or affirm when accepting office that they will abide by and uphold the laws of Arizona?

A.R.S. §38-231(G) does set forth such a requirement in the following language:

"In addition to any other form of oath or affirmation specifically provided by law for an officer or employee, before any officer or employee enters upon the duties of

his office or employment, he shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation:

state of Arizona, County of _______, I, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the constitution of the United States and the laws of the State of Arizona; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same, and defend them against all enemies, foreign and domestic, and that I will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of the office of ______ (name of office) according to the best of my ability, so help me God (or so I do affirm).

signature of officer or employee."

All members of state and municipal boards or agencies are subject to the foregoing provision, as A.R.S. §38-231(B) provides that:

"For the purposes of this section, the term officer or employee means any person elected, appointed, or employed, either on a part-time or a full-time basis, by the State, or any of its political subdivisions or any county, city, town, municipal corporation, school district, public educational institution, or any board, commission, or agency of any of the foregoing."

It is true that A.R.S. §38-231(E) was struck down as unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court in <u>Elfbrandt V. Russell</u>, 384 U.S. 11, 16 L.Ed.2d 321, 86 S. Ct. 1238. However, in conformity with Arizona Attorney General's Opinion No. 56-14, it is believed that section (E) of A.R.S. §38-231 is severable from the remainder of the statute and that, therefore, sections (B) (C) and (G), discussed herein, are all valid and enforceable.

A.R.S. §38-231 applies to all officers or employees whether or not they entered their positions prior to the effective date of the statute. A.R.S. §38-231(C) states that:

"Any officer or employee elected, appointed, or employed prior to the effective date of this act shall, not later than 90 days after the effect of this act, take and subscribe the form of oath or affirmation set forth in this section."

The effective date of the Act is March 30, 1961. Thus, every member of a state or municipal board or agency who properly holds his office has taken and subscribed the oath of office set forth in A.R.S. §38-231(G) and reproduced above. Indeed, failure to do so constitutes a misdemeanor under A.R.S. §38-442.

consequently, in answer to question No. 1, appointed or elected members of a state or municipal board or agency are required to swear or affirm when accepting office that they will abide by and uphold all the laws of the State of Arizona.

2. Does Arizona law permit the State Board of Technical Registration to require other state and municipal boards and agencies to comply with A.R.S. §32-144(4)?

Administrative officers and agencies have no common law or inherent power. The powers and duties of an administrative agency are to be measured by the statute creating it. Kendall v. Malcolm, 98 Ariz. 329, 404 P.2d 414 (1965).

The Technical Registration Act does not confer upon the State Board of Technical Registration, either explicitly or implicitly, the power to require that other state and municipal boards and agencies comply with A.R.S. §32-144(4). Therefore, the Board itself does not have the power to require compliance with this section of the statute without resort to the courts.

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However, in a matter properly brought before it by the Board, the Superior Court clearly has the power to order any state or municipal board or agency to comply with the laws of Arizona, including A.R.S. §32-144(4). Constitution of the State of Arizona, Art. 6, §6.

ARTICLE 1. BOARD OF TECHNICAL REGISTRATION

No. 32-101. Definitions.

Under this section, the definitions of the professions registered (A-chitect, Architect-in-Training, Assayer, Engineer, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist, Geologist-in-Training, & Land Surveyor) are defined as well as definitive descriptions of the practice authoriz- registration of the authorized professions, types of ed these professions.

No. 32-102. Board of Technical Registration. Establishes the Board and defines the method, terms, and size of Board appointed by Governor as well as the ex-officio member.

No. 32-103. Qualificiations of Members.

Defines qualifications of appointive members.

No. 32-104. Compensation. Defines allowances for mileage and travel expense, prohibits compen-practice by registrants in firms or corporations, requiresation to members and authorizes renewal without payment of fee.

No. 32-105. Organization. Establishes the organization of the Board and prescribes the minimum number of meetings.

No. 32-106. Powers and Duties. Defines the powers and duties and responsibilities.

No. 32-107. Board Secretary: Duties; Salary. Defines this officer's duties, salary and responsibility. No. 32-108. Annual Report; filing copies of lists of registrants.

Requires annual reporting to Governor, Secretary of State, and Boards of Supervisors.


No. 32-109. Technical registration fund. Establishes technical registration fund and prescribes method of depositing and disbursing.

ARTICLE 2. REGISTRATION

No. 32-121 through 32-128 describes the method of registration and certificates, defines seals and use for registrants, authorizes and describes for revocation of certificates.

ARTICLE 3. REGULATORY PROVISIONS.

No. 32-141 through 32-145 authorizes and defines ments of registrants on public works, grants exception to practice of registrants within the professions, authorizes exemptions and limitations on non-registrants, and enumerates violations and penalty for non-registrants.



This is a report on my findings in connection with my handwriting examination on the questioned D. E. Britt signature affixed over an imprint of a seal which reads "Registered Professional Engineer (Civil), Certificate To. 4834, in the name of Duncan E. Britt." This signature and seal impression appears on a blue print under the title "Reservoir For Arizona - Sonora Desert Museum".

This questioned signature was compared with known signature standards of D.E. Britt furnished me by your office.

It is my considered opinion that the questioned D. E. Britt signature is not a genuine signature of D. E. Britt. There are numerous characteristics in the questioned signature that are not consistent with the known standards of D. E. Britt. A number of factors were considered, including slant, the initial and finishing strokes, pen-pressure, pen movement, proportionate height of letters, connecting strokes, etc.

Should this matter ultimately result in court action and/or hearing, please allow at least ten days' notice so that adequate charts may be prepared for demonstration purposes.

You will find enclosed all materials submitted to me for study.

SUBJECT: Review of applications

As per your instructions and requests by other members I attempted to codify the present review of applications and establish guide lines. There is attached a Review of Applications Procedures and as this was being summarized under classifications I and II other associated problems prompted that more than guide lines on existing procedures was required to be considered.

The entire work load of applications is increasing requiring more and more time of individual board members to conduct personal audiences, make initial reviews of applications and discuss at board meetings the removing, justification and results of initial reviews. The members are also in this manner required to assume personally what should rightly be joint responsibility.

The applicant, too, expects positive board direction in the review of his application and is most willing to come when scheduled before the board or a committee thereof for application review and personal audience. I believe that behind this may be that firms will pay for travel expenses when a employee is directed to appear on a given date and when the date is variable desires that trip be combined for reimbursement or made at own expense.

Applicants and their employers consider nothing irregular about being notified of an exact time and place, as most states use this method of reviewing applications. The applicants and their firms, however, feel that the three month period between Board meetings for the personal audience puts an unjustified delay on securing registration which could be eliminated.

I have therefore presented in lieu of detailed guide lines for epplication review a completely new approach to be considered and the suggested procedure is under classification III.

These proposals while requiring an additional meeting each quarter on the part of members for evaluation committee meetings, does accomplish the following:

- (a) Members, as individuals, need no longer be forced to make and justify any requirements for registration of an applicant nor use office hours or weekends for such reviews.
- (b) Members need not allocate part of their normal business hours to conduct personal audiences and personally be praised or castigated by the applicant for the conduct and results of the audience.

- (c) Board meetings should be shortened for every applicant will know of the requirements for registration and will have been given an appearance and personal audience before the findings of the board become a matter of formal record.
- (d) Comprehensive Oral examination will be held, receive approval of the examination and receive approval of the results by all members of board at regular meetings.
- (e) Applicants will receive faster registration when fully qualified.

The recommendations, while trying to convey my thoughts on the subject, may or may not meet the members approval but it is sincerely requested that this meeting the board consider, give approval and authorize provisional use of the procedure for a trial period between the June and September meetings of the board.

There are available sufficient copies of this report for circulation to all members if you so direct.

I) The following is now in effect and in printed form:

A) Statuatory Authority

- ARS-32-106,A-3. The board shall consider and pass on applications for registration.
- 2) ARS-32-106,A-7. The board shall keep a register which shall show the date of each application for registration, the name, age, qualifications and place of business of the applicant, and the disposition of the application.
- 3) ARS-32-106,B. The board shall specify on the certificate of registration and annual renewal card issued to each registered engineer the branch of engineering in which he has demonstrated proficiency, and authorize him to use the title of registered professional engineer. The board shall decide what branches of engineering shall be thus recognized.

B) Statuatory Qualifications of Applicants

No. 32-121. Certificate required for practice of Architecture, Assaying, Engineering, Geology, or Land Surveying.

A person desiring to practice the profession of architecture, assaying, engineering, geology, or land surveying shall first secure a certificate of registration and shall comply with all the conditions prescribed in this chapter.

No. 32-122. Qualification of Applicant.

A. An applicant for registration as an architect, engineer or geologist shall be not less than twenty-five years of age and of good moral character and repute and shall have engaged actively for at least eight years in architectural, engineering or geological work of a character satisfactory to the board, but each year of teaching architectural, engineering or geological subjects or of study satisfactorily completed in an architectural, engineering or geological school approved by the board up to a maximum of five years, may be considered equivalent to one year of active engagement.

B. An applicant for registration as an assayer or a land surveyor shall have engaged actively for at least four years in assaying or land surveying work of a character satisfactory to the board, but each year of teaching assaying or land surveying or of study satisfactorily completed in a school approved by the board, up to a maximum of two years may be considered equivalent to one year of active engagement.

No. 32-123. Application for registration.

A. A person desiring to practice architecture, assaying, engineering, geology, or land surveying shall make application for registration on a form prescribed by the board, subscribed under oath and accompanied by the registration fee. If the evidence submitted satisfies the board that the applicant is fully qualified to practice the profession for which registration is asked, it shall give him a certificate of registration, signed by the chairman and secretary and attested by the official seal.

B. If in the judgment of the board the applicant has not furnished satisfactory evidence of qualifications for registration it may require additional data, or may require the applicant to submit to an oral or written examination.

C. If the application is denied, the registration fee shall be returned, less the cost of considering the application, as determined by the board.

No. 32-124. Registration Fees.

The following fees shall accompany applications for registration:

- For a certificate as an architect, engineer or a geologist, twentyfive dollars.
 - 2. For a certificate as an assayer or land surveyor, fifteen dollars.
 - 3. For a registration as an engineer-in-training, ten dollars.
- For a temporary permit to practice architecture, engineering, geology, 4. For a temporary permit to practice architecture, engineering, geology, assaying or land surveying, not to exceed a period of ninety days, by a non-resident holding a valid certificate of registration as an architect, engineer, geologist, assayer or land surveyor by another state or territory of the United States, fifty dollars.

No. 32-126. Registration without examination.

The board may register without examination an applicant who holds a valid and subsisting certificate of registration issued by another state or foreign country which has requirements for registration satisfactory to the board, or who holds a certificate of qualification issued by a national bureau of registration or certification.

6) Procedures established in rules (excerpts)

1) Rule I General Rules

A. Applications

- 1. The Board meets regularly in March, June, September, and December to consider applications for registration. No application will be presented to the Board for its consideration until all of the required information, including transcripts, concerning the application has been received. This includes a standard application form completely filled out, including required signatures on application, photograph, and affidavit. A fee of \$25.00 if for Architect, Geologist, or Professional Engineer, \$15.00 if for Assayer or Land Surveyor, \$10.00 if for Architect-in-Training, Engineer-in-Training, or Geologist-in-Training, must accompany the application form. It is the applicant's responsibility to sentre transcripts of his records from all colleges attended. The applicant must arrange to have these transcripts sent directly from the college registrar to the office of the Board. The applicant's sole responsibility regarding references is that of furnishing a suitable list. The office of the Board will request such information as it deems necessary from the references submitted by the appli-The Board meets regularly in March, June, September, and tion as it deems necessary from the references submitted by the appli-cant. References submitted by an applicant should include at least three persons registered in the same general field of experience as the applicant and two references who are now, or have been, the applicant's immediate supervisors. Other persons will be evaluated as references only if their responsibility and their ability to evaluate the technical competence of the applicant can be established by the
- 2. Engineers desiring registration in more than one branch must submit a separate application for each branch and pay the regular fee with each application, Registration in engineering will be granted in the major branches of engineering included in the college curricula approved by the Board. Major branches of engineering presenty recognized by the Board are: Aeronautical, Agricultural, Chemical, Civil, Electrical, Engineering Science, Geological, Highway, Industrial, Mechanical, Metallurgical, Mining, Nuclear, Petroleum, Sani-
- 3. The Board does not grant registration to residents of other States, except under unusual circumstances, unless they hold registra-tion in the State of their legal residence.
- 4. When an application for registration is denied, the applicant will be so notified. No re-application will be accepted until one year has elapsed from the date of the formal Board action denying the original application. When applications for registration are denied on hitial Board action, the following refunds of application fees will be made: Architect, Engineer, or Geologist, \$10.00; Assayer or Land Surveyor, \$5.00. Applicants whose applications for registration are denied subsequent to initial Board action will receive no refund of their application fees.
- 5. No application made on any other than a printed form issued by the Board will be accepted or considered by the Board, except

that, in the event any printed form issued by the Board does not contain sufficient space for the necessary evidence to be submitted, the applicant may attach additional sheets to said form to any desired extent, but such attached sheets must be of the same size as the printed form and shall be securely attached thereto.

- 6. An applicant may withdraw his application for registration by written request to the Board for approval of such withdrawal. An approved withdrawal is deemed by the Board to be a denial of an application for registration without prejudice and no refund of the application fee will be made.
- 7. An applicant for any of the three in-training programs shall, in order to be admitted to the in-training examinations, submit an application to the Board on the prescribed form for approval by the Board. It will be necessary for an applicant to pay the \$10.00 application fee required under Rule I-1 for registration as an Architectin-Training, Engineer-in-Training, or Geologist-in-Training, as well as the examination fees stated in Rule II-F.

2) Rule II Examinations

6. Professional Engineering—The complete professional engineering examination will consist of four parts with the exception of Structural Engineering, which will consist of six parts. Each part of the examination will be of four hours duration and requires a passing grade of 70% on each part of the examination. Parts I and II of this examination may be required of any applicant for registration as a professional engineer who graduated from an engineering college subsequent to January 1, 1953, and of all non-engineering college graduates applying for registration as a professional engineer.

All professional engineering examinations are open book and the applicant may bring any text or reference desired.

The parts of the professional engineering examination are defined as follows:

Part 1 Basic Sciences

Part 2 Engineering Sciences Part 3 Engineering Analysis

Part 4 Engineering Design

Part 5 Comprehensive Engineering Design

Part 8 Structural Engineering Design

3) Rule II-D- Comprehensive Oral Examination

The applicant for professional registration who has received a waiver of the written examination and a comprehensive gral examination substituted therefor, shall personally appear at a time and place indicated by the Board for oral demonstration of his proficiency in the area for which professional registration is applied. The oral examination held by the Board or a member thereof shall be of such duration as necessary to demonstrate the applicant's proficiency.

4) Rule II-E- Personal Audience

A personal audience will be required of all applicants in order to complete professional registration. The personal audience will consist of an oral examination of 15 to 30 minutes and will include questions covering the Code and Rules of the State Board of Technical Registration, The personal audience will be given at a time and place convenient to the Board by the Board or member of the Board. An applicant who fails to appear for a personal audience within six months from the date on which he was first notified to appear shall have his application for registration denied unless this rule is waived by the Board for good cause shown.

5) Rule III Experience

 Qualifying experience, other than time allowed for education, shall in general be limited to that time in which an applicant has been directly employed in a responsible position of a character satisfactory to the Board.

6) Rule VI Temporary Permits.

Temporary permits to practice architecture, engineering, geology, assaying or land surveying may be issued, covering one project only, for a period not to exceed ninety days to a non-resident holding a valid certificate of registration as an Architect, Engineer, Geologist, Assayer, or Land Surveyor by another state or territory of the United States who is an applicant for professional registration in Arizona. An applicant desiring a temporary permit shall file with his application for professional registration the prescribed form for a temporary permit. The temporary permit fee is exclusive of any application fee for professional registration.

II) The following is present procedure and practice (not printed) for professional registration:

A) By Office of Board

- Provides and receives applications for professional registration and insures proper fee is transmitted, after recording, to Treasurer.
- 2) Verifies that applicant is registered in his state of legal residence and that the form is properly filled out, picture is attached with signature and that application signature is notarized.
- Records necessary information required under ARS 32-106 A,7.
- 4) Verifies prior registrations direct with other states concerned.
- 5) Receives transcripts direct from universities and verified listed degrees.
- 6) Prepares a summery sheet showing name, age, address, proficiency registration requested, status of other registrations and education and summarizes the experience shown on the application.
- Sends application to board member for initial review and prepares composit summary for entire board action.
- Records and implements findings of board on each applicant.

B) By Engineer members of Board (as individuals)

Engineer, Geologist, Assayer and Land Surveyors applications are now sent to individual members of the board for first review after application is complete and this member must make a full determination as to the requirements for registration. If the member cannot determine a recommendation, he sends the application to full board discussion at a regular meeting.

c) By Architect members of Board (as committee)

Architect applications are sent to individual members for initial review after application is complete. The architect members, however, meet as a committee about three weeks before a board meeting and require all applicants to appear at that time for oral discussion of their abilities and Personal Audience. An applicant who does not appear will be held for one more committee meeting before the application is considered for denial.

The office of the board records the results of this meeting and circulates to all members of board, and all architectural applications are presented to the board as a unified result, one of the following recommendations:

- (1) Grant registration (ARS 32-123A and ARS 32-126).
- (2). Hold for lateral force (ARS 32-123B) treatise and problems with registration to be granted after receipt and approval of same.
- (3) Hold for written examinations (ARS 32-123B) and registration to be granted after passing grades are certified.
- (4) Deny. (ARS 32-123C).

D) Regular meetings of Board

- Accept recommendations of individuals and architectural committee.
- Discuss only applications on which members have indicated discussion is desired, or any application to which a member might disagree.
- Holds as requirements for registration action of one member which has always been subjected to dispute by dissatisfied applicant (Ludlow vs. STBR)

III) Suggested New Procedures

- A) By Board Chairman The board chairman shall:
 - Appoint all members of the board, other than architects, to Evaluation Committee #1.
 - 2) Appoint all architect members to Evaluation Committee #2.
 - Appoint chairmen to head each of these committees for the ensuing period between regular meetings to rotate work load among members.
 - 4) Establish that a quorum of three is necessary for committee #1 to function, and of two for committee #2.
 - 5) Secure agreement at regular meeting of the starting dates and location for evaluation committee meeting which shall be held at least two weeks before next scheduled board meeting.
 - 6) Charge each committee and office to perform the functions and make the recommendations described as follows in this proposal on all applicants to be reviewed by the board.
- B) Evaluation Committee #1
 The Committee shall:
 - Hear their chairman's comments on applications to be reviewed at the meeting prior to the appearance of the applicant in person.
 - Hear each applicant scheduled for review and conduct the personal audience and determine the qualifications of applicant in his field of requested registration.
 - 3) Determine the requirements for registration on each applicant and prepare recommendation for board action.
 - 4) Make to the board for consideration at the next regular meeting one of the following recommendations on each applicant:
 - (a) Grant registration (ARS 32-123A and ARS 32-126)
 - (b) Hold for comprehensive oral examination and grant registration if applicant is successful. (ARS 32-123B)

- (c) Hold for written examinations and grant registration after successful passing grades, in all sections required, are certified. (ARS 32-123B)
- (d) Deny registration (ARS 32-123C)
- (e) Deny applications of applicants, with refund, who have not appeared before committee after being scheduled twice for such meetings. (ARS 32-123C)

C) Evaluation Committee #2 The Committee shall:

- Adopt and implement the procedures established for Evaluation Committee #1, items 1 thru 3.
- 2) Adopt and implement procedures established for Evaluation Committee #1, item 4 and add the following recommendations for board consideration:
 - (f) Hold for lateral force treatise and problems with registration to be granted after receipt and approval of same.
 - (g) Deny applicants who do not provide acceptable treatise and problems on lateral forces within time allotted by Committee.
 - (h) Review treatise and problems submitted for approval.

D) The Board in regular meeting shall:

- Accept for discussion recommendations of evaluation committees on all applicants to be considered at regular meeting.
- Prepare and pass proper motions to implement recommendations of the committees.
- Hear appeals, in writing or person, by applicants on actions taken at regular meeting immediately past and determine registration requirements.

- 4) Conduct comprehensive oral examinations for all applicants who were so held at the committee meeting immediately prior to this meeting and determine registration requirements.
- 5) Prepare and pass such other motions as may be pertinent to applicants for registration to insure all applicants remain in current status with office of board.
- 6) Grant registrations to applicants who have met or passed all of the board's requirements.
- 7) Deny applicants so determined.

- 7) Notify applicant of meeting date of appropriate Evaluation Committee meeting, verify appearance of applicant at this meeting and/or notify applicant that his application was not complete and he will be rescheduled at a later date.
- 8) Notify applicant in detail of what committee will expect from him at meeting.

- 9) Prepare a summary sheet on each applicant showing name, age, address, proficiency of registration requested, status of other registrations and education and summarize the experience shown on the application.
- Gather such other information deemed necessary for complete evaluation.
- 11) Enter on original of summary sheet of applicant a first consideration report on the applicant's qualifications as defined in statutes or rules giving indicated requirements for registration.
- 12) The first consideration report shall show one of the following:
 - (a) Grant registration after P.A. because of prior registration by written examination.
 - (b) Registration after successful passing grades are certified on the following written examination sections as noted -

Arch. C,D,E,F,G,H,I Engr. 1,2,3,4,5,6 L.S. 1,2,3,4 Geo. 1,2,3,4 Assayer 4 hrs, 8 hrs

- (c) Review and determine equivalence of prior registration without examination.
- (d) Hold for lateral force treatise and problems before granting registration.
- (e) Deny registration with reasons.
- (f) Defer to chairman for recommendation to committee.
- 13) Transmit to chairman of appropriate committee all original summary sheets and complete application files on persons to be discussed and interviewed at next scheduled committee meeting.
- 14) Transmit to other members of committee Xerox copies of original summary sheets with first considerations shown.

- 15) Insure that all of the documents in 13 and 14 above are in hands of members 1 week before meeting.
- 16) If necessary, clarify with chairman or members how first consideration was determined prior to meeting date.

In accordance with your letter of October 11, 1967, I have approved the enclosed authorization and release form with the amendments indicated.

In a separate letter, also dated October 11, 1967, you asked, "Are Assayers, registered by this Board, bound by the Statute and Rules regarding assaying reports released by them?".

A.R.S. §32-125(B) states that:

"Plans, specifications, plats or reports prepared by a registrant or his bona fide employee, shall be issued under his seal." (Emphasis Supplied.)

Similarly, Rule IV(2) requires that:

"An imprint of the registrant's valid seal shall appear . . . on the cover and index page of each set of specifications and/or reports or other professional documents prepared by a registrant or his bona fide employee."

It is clear from the use of the word "reports" in both the statute and the rule that reports prepared by registered assayers are subject to the provisions of A.R.S. §32-125(B) and Rule IV(2) and, therefore, such reports must be issued under the seal of the registered assayer responsible for their preparation.

In a third letter dated October 11, 1967, you inquired whether or not the Board may incorporate the present code of ethics into its rules. It is the opinion of this office that, aside from the question of the Board's exceeding its statutory authority by doing so, the wording of certain parts of the present code of ethics is too broad and indefinite to warrant transforming the code into rules. Specifically, in the code of ethics, the use of the word "anyone" in paragraph number two, the use of the word "unethical" in paragraph four, all of paragraph six and the clause "in any other manner derogatory to the dignity of the profession" in paragraph seven would very likely fail a challenge of their validity if adopted as rules.

It is the further opinion of this office that there is no statutory authority for the incorporation of the proposed creed into the rules. A.R.S. §32-106(A)(1) states that:

"The board shall adopt by-laws and rules for the conduct of its meetings and performance of duties imposed upon it by law."

A.R.S. §32-106(A)(8) states that:

"The board shall do other things necessary to carry out the purposes of this chapter."
(Emphasis Supplied.)

The statute, then, authorizes rule-making, other than that pertaining to the conduct of meetings, only for the performance of legal <u>duties</u> and related <u>necessities</u>. Because the Board is under no duty to adopt the creed as part of

its rules, and because such a creed is not necessary to carry out the purposes of the Technical Registration Act, it does not appear that there is statutory authority for the enactment of such a creed into a rule.

In the discussion following, it was clarified that a copy of the letter to the non-registrant would be forwarded to the client when known. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Dryden and seconded by Mr. Place that the Board request the Assistant Attorney General to prepare a form letter regarding the above motion. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE RULES AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

Mr. Goodwin reported to the Board on an item referred by the Board to this Committee at their December meeting regarding design requirements for service stations. There was considerable discussion on this item indicating that varied opinions existed among the Board members regarding such designs. It was moved by Dr. Newlin and seconded by Mr. Eyring that service stations may be designed by registered architects or registered professional engineers. Motion carried.

He further reported that he did not believe the increased limits for work performed by non-registrants would be passed in this Legislature, and that the manufacturers' bill proposed to limit engineering practice was defeated in the committee.

REPORT OF THE EVALUATION AND EXAMINATION COMMITTEES

At the request of Mr. Girand, the Board went into Executive Session.

When the Board readjourned, Mr. Girand moved that future examinations be prepared and conducted as outlined in the memo dated March 5, 1968, from the Executive Secretary, Minute Pages 2169, 2170 and 2171. Motion carried.

The Board of Technical Registration was adjourned so that the members could sit as a Comprehensive Oral Review Committee with Professor Sigmund L. Smith for conducting the examination of Pete Soto Flores, File No. 68-8, Assayer.

When the Board readjourned, Mr. Goodwin reported, as Chairman of the Architectural Evaluation Committee, that the Committee had invited all persons who failed Site Planning and Architectural Design at the December examinations to a group conference and attempted in this conference to review passing and failing problems so as to assist the applicants in their future study.

It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Place that the architectural grades for the December, 1967, examinations, Minute Pages 2172, 2173 and 2174, be certified. Motion carried.

L Pasponsibility

The Executive Secretary will be charged with the security of the examinations the Executive and shall be solely responsible for same.

I. Pramination Preparation

A. Fundamentals of Engineering Examination

This examination is given to the Engineers-in-Training and professional engineers taking Parts 1 and 2 of the written examinations. The examination is prepared by N.C.E.E. and is forwarded to this Board upon receipt of a letter requesting same, signed by the Chairman of the Board. The examination is delivered to the Board by parcel post and is received approximately two weeks prior to the release date as published by N.C.E.E.

B. Architectural Examinations - C, F, G, H and I

These examinations are prepared by N.C.A.R.B. and the quantities are forwarded upon receipt of an order signed by the Executive Secretary. The examinations are delivered approximately two weeks prior to the release dates, published, by registered mail, addressee only, to the Executive Secretary.

C. Architectural Examinations - D and E

These examinations are prepared by committee method through the Western Conference of State Architectural Registration Boards and are delivered to this Board by first class mail service for the written portion of the examination which is reproduced locally, and the tracings by parcel post as prepared and printed by Chapman Press in San Francisco, California.

D. All Other Examinations for Professional Engineers, Assayers, Geologists and Land Surveyors

These examinations are prepared by this Board, reproduced in the office of the Board and may or may not be released to the candidate for his later use as previously determined.

1. Source of Questions

Questions for the examinations are provided by Arizona's Universities, past examinations of other states or by the Board members and other interested professionals.

2. Question Review

The Executive Secretary assembles suggested questions available in final form for review of acceptance by the Evaluation and Examination Committee and its Chairman or its Chairman designee. Additional questions in each category are available for review and substitution by any of the above members.

3. Selection

Final selection as made by the committee members, chairman or designee, are reproduced in the office of the Board under the supervision of the Executive Secretary.

IL Examination Security

A. Release of Unclassified Examinations

Examinations which are permitted to be retained by the applicant may be released to new applicants by the office of the Board except during the 30-day period immediately preceding the examination date. During this period, no employee is authorized to release past unclassified examinations to applicants unless authorized in writing by a member of the Board.

B. Examination File

The last five-drawer filing cabinet on the Eastside of the Storeroom will be designated as the Examination File. This cabinet has a lock and only one key which shall remain on the personal key ring of the Executive Secretary unless released to a member of the Board.

c. Fundamentals of Engineering Examinations

- 1. When received, shall be placed in the Examination File without opening the package in which delivered.
- 2. When distributed to the proctors, the case shall be opened in the presence of the Executive Secretary, assembled and resealed for delivery to the proctors by hand or registered mail.

D. NCARE Examinations

- 1. When received, shall be placed in the Examination File without opening the package in which delivered.
- When distributed to the proctors, the case shall be opened in the presence of the Executive Secretary, assembled and resealed for delivery to the proctors by hand or registered mail.

E. Architectural Examinations - D and E

- When received, the tracings shall be locked in the Examination File until assembling for delivery to the proctors by hand or registered mail.
- 2. The D and E questions, when received, will be typed, reproduced, assembled in books and placed in the locked Examination File by the Office Manager under the direct supervision of the Executive Secretary. When distributed to the proctors, it shall be by registered mail or hand delivery.

F. Custody

All examination questions assembled for consideration by the Board shall be only in the custody of the Executive Secretary and immediately upon

conclusion of any work done by the Executive Secretary on these exemination questions, all materials will be locked in the five-drawer filing cabinet, marked, "Examinations."

g. Final Reproduction of Selected Examinations

When the examinations have been finalized by the Board, the Executive Secretary will supervise the reproduction of same by the Office Manager requiring that all materials be returned to and locked in the Examination pile at any time the Executive Secretary must leave the office.

The completed examinations will remain locked in the Examination File until delivery to the proctors by hand or registered mail.

During the preparation, reproducing or assembling of any examination, in initial or final form, all voided, unused masters or copies will be shredded by tearing immediately upon the discovery that such masters or copies exist and all such torn or shredded materials will be placed in one of the unused drawers of the Examination File for disposal after the examination date.

H. Examination Masters

All final masters of examinations shall be preserved in the locked Examination File when not actually on the reproducing machine.

I. Delivery

Delivery of examinations referred to above, means registered mail, addressee only, return receipt requested, or if delivered by hand, means the Executive Secretary or bonded messenger service, return receipt requested.

After considerable discussion on this matter, Chairman Dryden directed that Grievance Committee #1 take no action at this time other than to request further evidence from Mr. Guirey on which we could take some action.

A discussion followed concerning Yost and Gardner in which it was alleged in the Arizona Daily Sun that the City of Flagstaff had filed a suit against the aforementioned registrants regarding a sewage treatment plant in the City.

Letter was read from the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers regarding a Frank Fair of Douglas, Arizona, and his apparent publicity calling himself an engineering graduate of the University of Missouri when, in fact, it was alleged he was not. The Committee by action held this matter for further information.

A discussion was held on Robert M. Williams, Jr., a registered Land Surveyor, No. 4123, regarding the use of the term "Engineer" on his business checks. Many of our State Laws (and including the Model Law) provide that no one shall "...by verbal claim, sign, advertisement, signature, letter-head, card or in any other way represent himself to be, or capable of being, an engineer...", at least until he has "...submitted evidence satisfactory to the Board that he is so qualified to practice, and it shall be unlawful to practice, or offer to practice until such person has been duly registered."

From time-to-time our Board receives applications from candidates registered in other states where these candidates have used the title "Engineer" prior to their being Registered.

On occasion we receive applications from candidates in our State who have used or are using the title "Engineer."

In the first place this appears to be unlawful.

In the second place some States have a provision in their law whereby the use of the title "Engineer" by a locomotive operator, maintenance workers, repairmen, mechanics,....does not fall within the jurisdiction of the Registration Act. In this case however, it is illogical for a Board to grant credit for this time in evaluating their record of "Experience in Engineering Work."

Our Board would appreciate the benefit of your views on this matter: whether you permit candidates, who are really EIT's, to use the fille "Engineer, Design Engineer," or the like in listing their experience; or, permit candidates from other States so to list themselves prior to their being Registered.

Iowa Board Loses Court Test

The Iowa State Board sought to enjoin the Electronic Engineering Co. of Des Moines, Iowa from seing the word "Engineering" in its company title, section 114.24 of the Iowa code reads:

"114.24 Injunction. Any person who is not legalty authorized to practice in this state according to the provisions of this chapter, and shall practice, or shall in connection with his name use any designation tending to imply or designate him as a professional engineer or land surveyor, may be respained by permonent injunction."

The Polk District Court in January 1967 refused to grant the injunction. It was appealed to the Iowa Supreme Court, case 251/52708. On 12 December 1967 it rendered its decision which included the following points:

The material facts are undisputed. From 1949 to 1958 William R. Clark and John J. Moffet, together with one other person, carried on a partnership business under the name of Electronic Engineering Company. In 1958 the business was incorporated under the same name. At the time of trial the business had been operated without interruption under this same for approximately 17 years, both as a partnership and as a corporation. The business of the defendant is principally that of installing and servicing two-way radios and mobile telephones. It also services and repairs home laundries, refrigerators, television sets, and air conditioning equipment. Defendant has never rendered professional engineering services, nor has it advertised that it is qualifled to do so. Nor, in 17 years, has anyone requested defendant to render professional engineering services.

Plaintiff, however, contends what defendant does is unimportant and how it advertises a immaterial. The sole issue raised by the petition is whether the use of the corporate name, Electronic Engineering Company, violates section 114.24 by implying defendant offers professional engineering services or by designating it as a professional engineering company.

The Chapter (114) does not require all engineers to comply with its terms, limiting its application to professional engineers as that term is defined in Section 114.2, Code, 1966.

The issue is a very narrow one, and is one which has not been previously considered by us.

The material facts are undisputed.

The sole issue raised by the petition is whether the use of the corporate name, Electronic Engineering Company, violates Section 114.24 by implying defendant offers professional engineering services, whereby designating it as a professional engineering company.

The term, "engineer," has now lost much of its original professional significance.

Reference is made to Webster's International Dictionary, Second Edition, for definitions of engineering, including within the term, one who runs an engine; one who manages a project by artful contrivance; and in military parlance, one engaged as a artilleryman or gunner. This same dictionary notes there are 41 special classifications under the definition of engineering and even then indicates there are still others not listed.

The dictionary reference is mentioned "merely to illustrate that 'engineer' no longer necessarily connotes professional competence or skill. Apparently the legislature recognized this in limiting the application of Chapter 114 to professional engineers, which Section 114.2 defines to exclude many of those who now use that term to describe their work or occupation. It must be conceded that 'engineers' and "professional engineers' are not synonymous. The use of one does not necessarily imply the other."

The sole issue here is whether the defendant's corporate name implies defendant renders professional engineering services or whether it renders any engineering services.

In considering that question, it is important to take into account all the circumstances surrounding the use of such name. This is particularly true since our finding is one of fact and prior decisions from other jurisdictions are of no help to us.

Under the evidence here we agree with the trial court that there is no violation of Section 114.24.

The National Council adopted as a policy in 1965 the recommendations of the Committee on Liaison with the ASEE Goals Study that future educational requirements for professional engineers should be talsed to require at least one year of professional engineering subjects beyond the baccalaureate demee. Note in the summary of the Goals report in mother article in this issue that this was included a their final report. Your Board of Directors feels that the Model Law should be promptly revised toward this objective.

another item is the consideration of changes in the registration process which Dr. Whitehead recommended for study last year and which has been referred to two committees of the National Council for study, Qualifications for Registration and resucipating Organization Liaison. The other same professions have found that suitable examinations should be given when the future professional graduates from college and that after a second of internship a further check should be made by a Board before the young professional is samed a license to practice. It is time for Engineers to change over to a similar procedure. A canual discussion is needed to work out the best procedure to be followed before we amend our

laws, where necessary, to provide for the revised procedure.

The Director of each zone has been asked to have a member of the appropriate committee listed above, when possible, to introduce the subject and give some of the suggested plans that should be considered.

Defendant has used its corporate name for 17 years without receiving a single request to render professional engineering services.

It is the public, not the plaintiff, which the law seeks to protect. The evidence makes it clear what plaintiff argues here has occurred to no one except plaintiff.

The statement is repeated: "As previously determined, this is a fact question to be determined in each case."

We find defendant's use of its corporate name, under the evidence in this case, does not imply the defendant renders professional engineering services nor does it designate defendant as a professional engineering company. The trial court's finding was right.

All Justices concurred in the opinion.

T. V. Engineers, Inc. of the District of Columbia was enjoined for similar practice but their law specifically prohibits use of the term at all in the title.

Another case in Wisconsin "State vs T. V. Engineers of Kenosha, Inc., Wisc. 141 NW, 2d 235, 239 was decided in favor of defendant TV Engineers of Kenosha recently.

Section 21 of the Model Law goes beyond the implying language which appears in most of the state laws. The current version of Section 21—Violations and Penalties includes a straight statement:—"any person, firm, partnership, organization, association, corporation, or other entity using or employing the words "engineer" or "engineering" or any modification or derivative thereof in its name or form of busines or activity except as authorized in this Act . . . shall be guilty of a misdemeanor . . ."

If the state engineering societies want to control the use of the title "engineer" the present provisions of the Model Law should be studied and the wording as given in the Model Law should be carefully followed in amending their state registration act.

At the March 21st meeting of the Board of Technical Registration, there was considerable discussion in your presence regarding advertisements by corporations purporting themselves to be both architects and engineer where the firm name does not have the name of a registered person in each proficiency.

The firm name discussed in this meeting was that of Henningson, Durham and Richardson, a Nebraska corporation, apparently authorized to do business in Arizona in which none of the principals named in the title of the firm are architects.

It was also discussed at this meeting that the Arizona Professional Corporation of Coons and Chonis, Architects, should be reviewed by your office in light of the above discussion.

A letter of opinion from your office, #63-27-L, Robert W. Pickrell, Attorney General, indicated that the Board could require the name of the registrant in responsible charge for a firm or corporation be imprinted on the firm's stationery under A.R.S. 32-141. Question:

Can the Board of Technical Registration, under A.R.S. 32-141, require the name of the registered professional in any category be included in the firm name?

OUESTION:

Can the State Board of Technical
Registration require that the name of
a firm or professional corporation
include a registrant from each of the

ANSWER:

No.

This question is answered on the basis of A.R.S. §32-141 which provides:

"No firm or corporation shall engage in the practice of architecture, assaying, geology, engineering, landscape architecture, or land surveying unless the work is under the full authority and responsible charge of a registrant, who is also a principal of the firm or officer of the corporation. The name of said registrant shall appear whensoever the firm hame is used in the professional practice of the firm or corporation." (Emphasis Supplied.)

The statute requires that firm or corporate work be done under

the direction of an appropriate registrant who must assume responsibility for it. Further, it requires that the registrant be a principal of the firm or officer of the corporation involved. However, this same statute also directs that the registrant's name appear whenever the firm name is used in professional practice. Inescapably implied in this provision of law is the conclusion that the registrant's name, which must appear solely in connection with professional practice, need not be included in the firm or corporate name. Considering the manner in which this statute is worded any ruling that a firm or corporate "principal" includes only one whose name appears in the firm or corporate name, could not be supported.

This opinion is consistent with prior interpretations of A.R.S. §32-141 rendered by this office and should be read in conjunction with them. Of particular relevance are Attorney General Opinion No. 61-101-L discussing the meaning of the phrase "full authority and responsible charge of a registrant" and Attorney General Opinion No. 63-27-L defining "professional practice."

In conclusion, this opinion should not be construed as modifying the ruling contained in Opinion No. 63-27-L that the State Board of Technical Registration may require the name of the registrant responsible for an area of practice to be imprinted on firm or corporate stationery used in connection with that practice.

Your letter of March 28, 1968, addressed to Darrell F. Smith, Attorney General, concerning certain effects of House Bill 173 has been referred to me for reply.

House Bill 173 (Ch. 92, Sess. Laws, 2nd Regular Session, 28th Legislature) is an act defining landscape architectural practice and providing that landscape architects shall be registered as a separate proficiency with the State Board of Technical Registration. Prior to the passage of this act, it was the position of the Technical Registration Board that certain aspects of landscape architectural practice fell within the definition of architectural practice and engineering practice.

You have asked whether in setting up this new and separate proficiency architects and engineers have necessarily been excluded from the practice of landscape architecture. It is my opinion that a partial exclusion has resulted, as explained in this letter.

architectural practice is defined in A.R.S. § 32-101-2 and it includes the "... evaluation, planning, [and] design in connection with ... site development." A.R.S. § 32-143 provides that a registered architect may engage the practice of engineering or a registered engineer in the practice of architecture to the extent that he is qualified and the work is necessary and incidental to the work of his registered proficiency,

construing the above mentioned statutes, it is apparent that an architect may lawfully do planning and design work in connection with site development. To the extent that a registered engineer is permitted by A.R.S. § 32-143 to practice architecture, he may also engage in this activity.

As a result of the enactment of House Bill 173, to the extent that landscape architectural practice includes activities not found within the definition of architectural practice, neither a registered architect nor a registered engineer may now enter the field. A.R.S. § 32-143 was not amended to provide that a registered architect or a registered engineer may engage in the practice of landscape architecture when necessary and incidental to his registered proficiency.

You should note that the law does not draw a clear line between the practice of architecture and the practice of landscape architecture. As a solution to this problem the Board should consider adopting interpretive rules defining the limits of architectural practice in the area of landscape architectural practice. In the alternative, the Board could request the legislature to amend A.R.S. § 32-143 to allow registered architects and registered engineers to practice landscape architecture. As introduced, House Bill 173 provided for a partial exemption in this area. It provided that a registered architect might practice lancecape architecture. However, by its language it prohib ted a registered engineer from doing so. Should the Board desire to amend A.R.S. § 32-143 in favor of both arch tects and engineers, the original language appearing in House Bill 173 is not satisfactory.

Finally, in answer to your question whether architects and engineers who have been performing landscape architectural services may qualify for registration as landscape architects, you should note the provisions of A.R.S. § 32-146,

Dear Mr. Edelblut:

Reflecting our telephone conversation this morning, I am writing to clarify my opinion to you concerning the effect of House Bill 173, which I rendered by letter dated April 3, 1968. In particular, you referred to a case from the Arizona Court of Appeals, Div. 2, construing the words "site development" as they appear within the definition of architectural practice contained in A.R.S. 32-101 (2).

In the case, <u>Jackling v. Snyder</u>, 3 Ariz. App. 63 (1966), a person who held himself out as a "golf course architect" brought suit to collect on a contract to design a golf course near Sedona. In defense to his claim, it was alleged that the work involved required the services of a registered architect, and since the plaintiff was not such a person, he was prohibited from recovery. Holding that the plaintiff did not need to be licensed as an architect, the court stated as follows:

whether the plaintiff Snyder must have a license as an architect to design and supervise the construction of golf courses is not whether some or all of his services might lawfully be performed by a licensed architect, but whether such functions are necessarily embraced within the scope of the statute. We feel and therefore hold that the term "site development" as used in Section 32-101 Subsection 2 A.R.S. is limited to work which is a necessary part of the preparation of a site on which a building or other structure is to be or is placed. We do not believe that the statute is broad enough to include golf course architects."

In our telephone conversation, you questioned whether this restrictive definition of site development, when combined with restrictive definition of site development, when combined with the establishment by House Bill 173 of a separate registered the establishment by House Bill 173 of a separate registered proficiency for landscape architecture, now prohibits an archimotopic from engaging in site development beyond that which is "a tect from engaging in site development beyond that which is "a necessary part of the preparation of the site on which a building or other structure is to be placed".

It is my opinion that the restrictive definition of site development contained in the <u>Jackling</u> case does not place any restrictions upon the practice of architecture. Standing alone, the case merely holds that one need not be licensed as an architect in order to design a golf course. In fact, by referring to the quotation from the case set forth above, you will find a clear implication that a registered architect may in fact engage in the design of colf courses.

The passage of House Bill 173 , amending A.R.S. 32-101, followed the Jackling case decision and supersedes it. This result occurs because House Bill 173 defines landscape architectural practice as including "the settings and approaches to buildings, structures, facilities, or other improvements..." In other words, landscape architectural practice as defined by the last legislature now includes the elements of the term site development as defined previously by the court. However, the term site development still appears in the statute. Presumably the legislature meant something different in defining site development and landscape architectural practice. In view of this hopeless conflict between the court and legislative definitions, the most recent statement of the legislature must prevail. Therefore, I conclude that the court's definition of site development is no longer authoritative.

Perhaps a discussion of the <u>Jackling</u> case should have been included in my letter of April 3. However, I felt that letter was long and perhaps confusing enough without the addition of materials which in no way affected the opinion rendered. Hopefully, this supplement to the letter will clarify any misunderstanding which may have arisen.

at this point, it may be appropriate to reiterate my former conclusion arising from the passage of H.B. 173. Prior to the est-sblishment of landscape architecture as a registered proficiency,

no license of any kind was required to engage in site developand so long as no structure was involved in the planning. See the Jackling opinion, infra. However, in creating landscape architecture as a registered proficiency, the legislature presumably intended that only a licensed landscape architect sould practice in this area. The problem, of course, is in sefining the "area" included exclusively within the definition of Landscape Architecture. The Board of Technical Registration may well be unable to find that a distinct new proficiency has been created. It may decide that Landscape Architecture is but a subdivision of architecture, thereby allowing a registered architect to practice both proficiencies. On the other hand, it may draw lines between the two areas, thereby restricting an Architect's practice. The problem is one peculiarly within the Board's area of competence, in any event, since its intelligent resolution demands knowledge possessed only by the professionals involved in this type of practice. There are no truly relevant court decisions in this state.

Note, however, that the amendment of A.R.S. 32-143 may not solve the question in a satisfactory manner. The exemption contained in that statute, as proposed, would allow the practice of landscape architecture by an engineer or architect only to the extent such practice was incidental to the engineer or architect's normal practice. Still it would be necessary to determine the limits upon those areas of proficiency.

It remains my conclusion that the problems raised in this letter and the letter of April 3 can be adequately resolved, at least on a temporary basis, by suitable Board rulings.



These states were Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming. The following represented Headquarters N.C.E.E.:

- G. F. Branigan, President-Elect, and
- J. H. Sams, Executive Secretary.

The Arizona delegation consisted of W. J. Edelblut, Joyce Smith, and C. W. Newlin.

The minutes of the Wilmington meeting were approved.

President Whitehead reported on the Board meeting held in Little Rock, Arkansas, and stated that a Constitutions and By-Laws Committee would continue study on qualifications for registration during 1969. Sample questions will be furnished to the state boards for release to the public.

Or. Sams reported on past examinations and announced that it is expected that Industrial and Structural examinations will be furnished for the coding National Professional examinations. He noted that a conflict existed between the Graduate Record Examinations and the National Professional Examinations, and that an effort must be made to avoid this conflict in the future.

president-Elect George Branigan voiced his concern that two-thirds of the engineers are not licensed, and suggested that state boards consider modification of existing laws to overcome this problem. He felt the technical society should get involved in establishing favorable registration laws.

Under Unfinished Business, Mr. Orland C. Mayer distributed the drafts of the Procedures and Policies Committee for consideration. A motion was approved that a procedural outline was desirable for the Western Zone Meetings. This outline, together with corrections, is attached to this report.

Leo W. Ruth submitted the report of the Nominations Committee, which was approved by unanimous ballot as follows:

President-Elect, W. M. Allen, Oregon Director, G. K. Borg, Utah.

Mr. Henry J. Ochs reported that the Annual Meeting of the N.C.E.E. will be held in Denver, Colorado, from August 26-30. The meeting location will be the Brown Palace Hotel.

Jack J. Koogler, New Mexico, and Robert W. Millard, Nevada, discussed changes in the model law. State boards will be asked for their comments concerning these changes.

Robert W. Henderson, President Whitehead, and Director Allen discussed the problem of increasing registration of engineers. The registration of engineers in industry was emphasized. Director Allen reported on a meeting that was held with representatives of industry to discuss registration. The following proposal evolved:

- 1. Broaden the scope of the E.I.T. to include the third and fourth year curriculum. Parts I and II would be eliminated for those with 15-20 years of experience.
- 2. Registration would be granted on the basis of an oral exam after the applicant had completed four years of professional work. This oral exam would be given by a committee made up of specialists in the field of the applicant's specialty. No written exams would be required beyond those given at the time of graduation.

Considerable discussion evolved from the above recommendations, but no conclusions were reached. It was moved, seconded, and approved that a committee be appointed to study registration requirements and procedures.

Ruth, Sutton, and Newlin reported on recent revisions to registration laws in their respective states.

It was moved, seconded, and adopted that the Western Zone boards encourage and promote the fundamentals examination and Professional Engineering examination wherever possible, and that in the interests of security the examinations be held on the release dates issued by N.C.E.E.

McClellan, Oregon, stated that Oregon State now has a four-year program in engineering technology, and discussed the details of that program. After considerable discussion Director Allen appointed the following committee to study and make concrete suggestions on the problems arising from the technology degree: McClellan, Oregon; Stout, Montana; Newlin, Arizona; Bromilow, New Mexico; Sutton, Nevada.

President-Elect Branigan reported on the 1968 Goals Report.

It was moved, seconded, and adopted that the 1969 Western Zone Meeting be held in Portland, Oregon.

After numerous resolutions of thanks, etc., of the Resolution Committee were approved, the meeting was adjourned at 12:00 noon, Saturday, May 4.

E - Minutes

The recording and printing of Zone Meeting proceedings shall be the responsibility of the Zone Secretary and the Director. Distribution of the minutes shall be made to each Board in the Zone.

II Officers

(The Director)

Officers shall be nominated and elected as indicated in Article III, Paragraph A, Nominating Committee.

A - The Director shall:

1. Be the administrative officer of the Zone.

- 2. Shall be the official spokesman and representative of the Western Zone to the National Council.
- 3. Preside at all meetings.

4. Appoint all committees.

- 5. Present Zone reports, including a statement of Zone Policies adopted, to the National Council.

(7. Director shall appoint a Secretary.)

B - Secretary

The Secretary of the Zone shall:

1. Keep and maintain records of all records of all Zone Meetings. 2. Assist in editing the material to be included in the proceedings of

3. Arrange for recording and printing of the minutes of the Zone Meetings.

4. Keep and maintain records of all special meetings.

5. Keep and maintain records of all Zone Policy Statements and place them in the proceedings of the Meeting (and maintain a special file as hereinafter

provided).

6. Assist the Director of the Zone in the general conduct of his office.

7. Maintain a record of the order of past Zone Directors and meeting places. 8. Hold and report on all funds of the Western Zone and disburse such funds

as allocated by the Director by signed voucher.

III Regular Committees

A - Nominating Committee

1. The Director shall appoint the nominating committee prior to the Annual Zone Meeting. (shall select the nominee)

B - Resolutions Committee

The Director shall appoint a resolutions committee consisting of not less than three members in attendance, at the beginning of each Zone Meeting. This committee shall prepare suitable resolutions for action by the meeting before adjournment.

C - Special Committees

Special Committees as required or as instructed by Board action shall be made by the Director. These committees shall prepare the reports on subjects deemed suitable for study and promotion by the Director and or the Board.

IV Financing Zone Activities

A - Zone Meeting Expenses

The-cost-of-conducting-the-Zone-Meeting-is-the-joint-financial-obligation of-the-Western-Zone-and-the-hosting-Board.

The Zone Director, Zone Secretary and the hosting Board will fix the registration fee as required for the needs of the meeting. The registration fee shall be adjusted to prevent the accumulation of an excessive amount in the Zone balance, but any profit or loss arising from the Zone Meetings shall be assumed by the Zone.

B - Zone Meeting Proceedings

The cost of recording, editing, printing and distributing the combined proceedings of the meeting and preceeding Annual Meeting of the Western Zone shall be a responsibility of the Zone and-not-the-host-Board.

An-invoice-for-this-proceeding-publication-shall-be-sent-to-each-Board-by the-Secretary-of-the-Zone.

A minimum of X copies of the Proceedings shall be supplied to each Board. (one copy per Board member and secretary unless otherwise requested)

(Discussion: Number of copies to be supplied to each Board.)

Proposed Zone Policy Statements

- A Any Member Board or a member of such Board desiring to place before the Zone, a Zone Policy Statement for action by the Zone, may do so at any meeting. If possible such policy statements should be submitted to the Director prior to the meeting for inclusion in the program. The Zone Director may propose at his own discretion and place on the agenda such policy statements as he may deem advisable.
- B If the proposed Zone Policy is accepted and approved by the Zone, the Secretary shall place it in his record of such statements and include it with such recorded statements in the proceedings of the meeting at which it is approved or add it as an amendment to this "Statement of Procedures and Policies" in accordance with its content.
- C The Secretary shall maintain a permanent record of all Zone Policy Statements. These shall be maintained in a special file entitled "Statement of Procedures and Policies."

The following is a report of the meeting held June 20, 1968, beginning at 9:00 A.M. in the Administration Building of Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona. The committee members present were:

> C. W. Dryden, Chairman Carl T. Eyring John Girand Kemper Goodwin Charles W. Newlin

The first item of business was a discussion with Mr. Robert M. Williams, Jr., a registered Land Surveyor, No. 4123, regarding his advertising on company checks, cards, letterheads and newspaper articles submitted by others, inferring that his company provided engineering services. Mr. Williams explained that his operation was a partnership with Donald H. Collar, registered Civil Engineer, No. 1873, and that no violation of the Technical Registration Act was intended. After considerable discussion with Mr. Williams, he was asked to leave the room at which time the members further discussed this situation. Mr. Williams was then called back into the room and at the request of the Committee Chairman, the Executive Secretary informed Mr. Williams that he was in violation of the Technical Registration Code, Rules and By-Laws and the Committee suggested that he take steps to correct the situation so that his operation fully complied with the word and intent of the Statutes. It was a further desire of the Committee that Mr. Williams have such reorganization as was needed within thrity calendar days and notify the Board of his actions.

The Committee then discussed a complaint under oath from Guirey, Srnka and Arnold regarding Mary Moppets, Inc., schools and an apparent plagiarism or misconduct on the part of Stefan Ryciak, registered Architect, No. 4423. It was moved by Mr. Girand and seconded by Mr. Eyring that the Grievance Committee #1 invite Mr. Ryciak to its next meeting for the purpose of discussing the similarity between the plans for the Montesori Systems Day School and those prepared by Guirey, Srnka and Arnold for Mary Moppets, Inc. Motion

Mr. Goodwin reported that the item regarding Bert Thorud, registered Architect, was not sufficiently investigated for a report at this time and suggested it be held for a future meeting of the Grievance Committee.

A discussion was held on the following complaints which were referred back by the County Attorney, Attorney General and the Board to this Committee:

> 1-67-05-01 Hunt, Kelly 1-67-05-02 Stark, G. W. 1-67-05-03 Carlson, George O. 1-67-05-04 Roosen's Design Service

Discussion followed regarding these individuals and what action this Committee should recommend to the Board in each instance. It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Eyring that the committee recommend to the Board that a letter be written as approved by the Attorney General to the Board these individuals notifying them of the apparent violation, their nonregistration, and that the Board was continuing investigation for future alleged violations. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Girand and seconded by Dr. Newlin that clarification of the procedures involving nonregistrants was required and every effort to speed up Grievance Committee actions to process complaints is needed. The Grievance Committee should schedule this item for the next meeting. Notion carried.

members of the Board to the Board with the comment that no change of Mr. Fellows' examination status was recommended.

The following concerning a ruling of the Supreme Court of Washington was read to the Board for their information:

"State Court Upholds Licensing Board's Right to Consider Esthetics

"The Supreme Court of the State of Washington upheld the Architect Licensing Board's denial of a certificate of registration to an applicant because his two examinations did not meet the Board's established design standards. The applicant charged that the Board 'had been arbitrary and capricious because it judged (his) examination designs upon subjective considerations involving aesthetics, individual taste, and discretion, rather than upon the objective standards of safety and health...'

"The Supreme Court disagreed, noting that Washington State law allows the Board to consider 'the aesthetic or structural design of private or public buildings.' The court rejected claims that the Board had been arbitrary since it graded the applicant's examination under an unidentified number and gave it the same consideration as other examinations."

The Executive Secretary presented to the Board for their information a letter from L. E. Johnston of Sverdrup & Parcel and Associates regarding their practice in Tempe, Arizona.

The Executive Secretary advised that other states were having problems with the previously established Fundamentals of Engineering examination dates due to the Graduate Record Examination. This office advised the National Council of Engineering Examiners that Arizona could accept any date selected if notified at least 90 days prior thereto.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Dean Hall reported on an article published in Mining Engineering, April, 1954, which was a comprehensive set of guidelines for the registration of Geophysical Engineers which are attached as Minute Pages 2257, 2258, 2259, 2260, 2261 and 2262.

WHAT DIFFERENTIATES THE GEOPHYSICAL ENGINEER?

by James B. Macelwane, Dean St. Louis University

(Mining Engineering, April 1954)

What characterizes a geophysical engineer and sets him apart from all other that characterizes a question that is important not only for acrediting purposes but assuming increasing importance in the licensing of professional geophysical engiters by state boards.

Mhat is the basis of distinction of one type of professional engineer from mather type is answered in part by the need which brought each type into being precisely because that need could not be satisfied by pre-existing types and which nevertheless demanded the special outlook, training and abilities of an engineer. The need which called for the civil engineer was the adaptation to the tasks of civilian life of the capabilities developed by the military engineer for the design and construction of roads, bridges, dams, carthworks, military buildings, and other structures and of mechanisms required by military operations.

With the advent of steam power the mechanisms became vastly more complicated and the result was the splitting off of the mechanical engineer who added specialization in the modynamics to the civil engineer's competency in properties and strength of materials and hydraulics. Again the development of electrical power required a new type, the electrical engineer with mathematical training and ability to apply the theory and physics of potential and force fields and vectorial relations to electric machinery and power transmission lines with their waves and transients. Into this picture came the tevelopment of atomic physics, the advent of the electron tube and the requirement of proficiency in network theory and electronic circuitry which threatened a dichotomy of electrical engineers into power engineers and electronic engineers. The appearance of the transistor suggests further complications.

In the meanwhile the chemists were not idle. A need soon arose for chemical detelopment and manufacture on a full industrial scale with all the problems of process and plant design and operation in a regime of intense competition. The industrial themist found himself saddled with much of mechanical engineering and became a chemical regimeer. The development and exploitation of a known oil field placed requirements that could not be satisfied by the petroleum geologist, the chemical engineer or the rechanical engineer. The result was the emergence of the petroleum engineer. And so the special needs have called into existence each of the other types of professional regimeer.

In every instance it was not a question of greater specialization within the field of experency of an older type of engineer, but of a new and quite different requirement that called for the new type.

such is the history of engineering. On the one hand there had arisen a crying and on the other hand there had accumulated a body of scientific knowledge discovered by basic research which awaited only the skilled hand of a new engineer who could that knowledge to fill the need.

gith the dawn of the third decade of the twentieth century, the geophysical scilegan to develop at an accelerated pace, stimulated by the needs of World War I
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by the third decade of the present century nearly all the oil fields in the U. S. with good surface indications had been found. At this juncture the geophysical engineer began to appear on the scene with his ability to design geophysical apparatus and to devise economically feasible procedures for the location of deeply buried and hidden oil traps, such as salt domes, anticlines, faults, old shore lines and reefs, by means of observational anomalies in the potential and force fields above them, or echoes from them. Only in recent years has the same need been recognized in the mining industry and the geophysical engineer been called into cooperation with the mining engineer and geologist.

In many localities commercial deposits of sand, gravel, limestone are at a premium because they do not appear at the surface and are limited in extent. The geophysical engineer is called upon for the design of procedures and apparatus for the discovery and sapping of such deposits at a cost that permits their exploitation at a profit. The quarrying and strip mining industries must know the depth and character of the overburden that is to be removed from a given prospect before they can decide whether it can be worked at a profit.

Core drilling to any considerable depth is slow and costly. The geophysical engineer can reduce drilling to a minimum while furnishing the same information more continuously, more rapidly, and at a small fraction of the cost. The same is true of highway routes, bridge and dam footings, and building foundations. Where water supplies are limited, the geophysical engineer can devise ready methods of locating perched water tables, tracking buried gravel trains, and stream beds, and artesian aquifers at costs that are not prohibitive. Determining by actual measurement and analysis of the vibrations caused by blasting the limiting strength of charge that is harmless to surround-the structures is a problem that is readily solved by the geophysical engineer. The list true of vibrations that are due to certain industrial operations. One of the tost recent calls for the ingenuity of the geophysical engineer is the distinction between disturbed and undisturbed ground and the outlining of cavities in archeological emploration.

SUMMARY

The geophysical engineer is characterized by his ability to apply not only general sentific principles but specifically the geophysical sciences to the design, construction, and calibration of suitable geophysical equipment; to plan and execute discriminal application of these sciences and their instrumentation to problems of exploration is conserved by valuable subsurface deposits of petroleum, ores, and other minerals; to be design of water supplies; to the delimitization and characterization of bed rock overburden; and to the measurement and analysis of industrial vibrations and their actual effects. He is characterized by his ability to forecast the performance of the supplies and procedures under the limitations imposed by their design and

or circumstances of their application; to estimate with accuracy the cost of the peration and to adjust the procedure to the justifiable outlay in view of immediate or returns; and to do all this in full consideration of business. pration and to do all this in full consideration of human relationships and long range returns; and property. safety to life and property.



Program Narrative

PURPOSE: This agency is established to <u>register</u> and <u>regulate</u> the practice of Architects, Assayers, Engineers, Geologists, Landscape Architects and Land Surveyors for the protection of the health, welfare and safety of the public.

FUNCTION: As defined in Title 32, Chapter I, ARS 1956

ARTICLE I. BOARD OF TECHNICAL REGISTRATION

No. 32-101. Definitions.

Under this section, the definitions of the professions registered (Architect, Architect-in-Training, Assayer, Engineer, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist, Geologist-in-Training, Landscape Architect, Landscape Architect-in-Training and Land Surveyor) are defined as well as definitive descriptions of the practice authorized for these professions.

No. 32-102. Board of Technical Registration.

Established the Board and defines the method, terms, and size of Board appointed by Governor as well as the ex-officio member.

No. 32-103. Qualifications of Members.
Defines qualifications of appointive members.

No. 32-104. Compensation.

Defines allowances for mileage and travel expense, prohibits compensation to members and authorizes renewal without payment of fee.

No. 32-105. Organization.

Establishes the organization of the Board and prescribes the minimum number of meetings.

No. 32-106. Powers and Duties.

Defines the powers and duties and responsibilities.

No. 32-107. Board Secretary: Duties; Salary.

Defines this officer's duties, salary and responsibility.

No. 32-108. Annual Report; filing copies of lists of registrants.

Requires annual reporting to Governor, Secretary of State, and Board of Supervisors.

No. 32-109. Technical registration fund.

Establishes technical registration fund and prescribes method of depositing and disbursing.

ARTICLE II. REGISTRATION

No. 32-121 through 32-128 describes the method of registration of the authorized professions, types of registration and certificates, defines seals and use for registrants, authorizes and describes for revocation of certificates.

ARTICLE III. REGULATORY PROVISIONS.

No. 32-141 through 32-145 authorizes and defines practice by registrants in firms or corporations, requirements of registrants on public works, grants exception to practice of registrants within the professions, authorizes exemptions and limitations on non-registrants, and enumerates violations and penalty for non-registrants.

No. 32-146 establishes Grandfather's Clause for Landscape Architects.

Mr. Ryciak had been invited on September 3rd to appear before this committee and the Executive Secretary indicated that he was present.

It was moved by Mr. Girand and seconded by Dr. Newlin that this committee close the complaint as the matter did not appear to be a violation of the Technical Registration Act in that no evidence was presented to substantuate other than an apparent similarity between the plans. Motion carried.

At the direction of the Chairman, the Executive Secretary thanked Mr. Ryciak for his attendance and apologized for waiting while the matter was discussed by the members of the Board, but, that it was not necessary to add his testimony to the matter at hand.

Gentlemen:

With my 46th annual report, received today, there was a notice which in the 4th paragraph indicated an intention to uphold the requirement that all buildings worth more than \$10,000 be designed by registrants.

Does this apply to all new construction and alterations? Does it only apply to buildings? What about water systems, wells, dams, sewage plants, etc.? Or does it perhaps apply and is not politic to enforce now? (I am not being facetious or ironical in the last statement) Does the board intend to enforce this provision through the courts? Or has the board reached some agreement with the various municipalities and county agencies to withold permits?

This provision and its enforcement could be extremely important to the engineers and architects of the state. If it were possible, I should like to see such questions as I have asked answered in a letter to all registrants, not only myself.

- 3. That the plans in issue were originally prepared by the plaintiff in connection with another project, and were then changed for the current job under the plaintiff's instructions and use of the plaintiff's seal and name authorized by said plaintiff.
- 4. That the plans were done on an accommodation basis for the Desert Museum without fee to plaintiff.
 - 5. That the plans were intended as "preliminary" plans.
- 6. That the plaintiff inspected the site before the inspection actually took place, and was in Tucson for two days working out final drawings.
- That the final plans were drafted by the plaintiff in Fort Lauderdale,
 Florida.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Upon the foregoing, the court finds that the revocation of plaintiff's registration was too severe a penalty, and therefore an unreasonable action by the defendant board under the unusual set of circumstances in this case.

It was moved by Mr. Girand and seconded by Mr. Cassidy that Rule III (A) of the proposed rules, subsections one through four, be deleted and the following become Rule III (A):

"Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects and Land Surveyors may engage in architectural, engineering, landscape architectural or land surveying practice insofar as such practice is in accord with the custom and tradition of architecture, engineering, landscape architecture and land surveying."

Considerable discussion followed and the consensus of the Board was that if Mr. Keller would produce plans together with supplemental information to the office of the Board with a letter in writing, the matter could be taken into consideration by Grievance Committee #1 for investigation.

Gentlemen:

I am writing with regard to the Registration Examination, Section III, Engineering Analysis which was given Sunday, December 8, 1968 in Tucson.

I feel the examination questions as given Sunday should be modified and am willing to help do so. To qualify myself as a critic the following is submitted.

- (a) Age 61
- (b) Graduated from the University of Arizona in 1930 with a B.S. in Electrical Engineering.
- (c) Worked in electrical engineering at the local power Company for 8 years prior to going into private practice.
- (d) Have been registered as an electrical engineer in the State of Arizona (No. 854) since 1938 some 30 years.
- (e) Have been in private practice as a consulting electrical engineer for 21 years doing all phases of electrical engineering that require a registered electrical engineer.

In retrospect, some 30 years ago the electrical engineer had two basic choices to follow.

- (1) "Communications" such as telephone and some radio and sound.
- (2) "Power" such as utilities, or construction, or working for the large electrical manufacturers.

Recent years have developed the so-called "Electronic" Engineer which is an advancement in the communications field. Many of these electronic men have graduated from college and gone into work to meet the war effort, communications and

computer requirements. The electronics field has grown so much that the "Institute of Electrical Engineers" merged with the Electronic Engineers and now the association is called the "Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers."

As practiced today in the State, the majority of work of the electronic engineers does not seem to require registration. This includes radio equipment, sound systems, working for large manufacturing concerns such as Motorola, the United States Government, Hughes, etc. However, the construction business such as the electrical work in connection with housing projects, high rise buildings, schools, universities, factories, civic buildings, power distribution for the above, lighting of parking areas, street lights, etc., does require the stamp of an electrical engineer.

Your recent "Registered Professional Examination in Electrical Engineering, Rule II, Section "C" Part III - Engineering Analysis" given Sunday, December 8, 1968, at the University of Arizona Civil Engineering Building did not have a question relating to any of the above. There was one question on the theoretical arrangement of wires on a distribution power line. The other questions were on circuitry -- predominantly electronics. This test could be passed by senior students in college without 4 years of experience in the field. A graduate has the engineering choice of entering electronics, the power company, or working for someone in the so-called "Construction Industry."

If electronic engineers are to be classed as electrical engineers then it seems the type of questions given in the test should be divided into those used during the 4 year apprenticeship (Engineer-in-Training) which he performs. This could be divided into -

- (1) Electronic training
- (2) Power Company training
- (3) Construction training

All of these trainings are different. In my opinion, questions should be directed toward ascertaining if the man has learned practical application of his theory he learned in school and not questions a graduating senior

can answer. A man working in the field for 4 years in my type of consulting business would not be qualified to work with transistors or communication design.

To summarize my observations, I would state that the test should provide enough examples that a qualified person with practical and theoretical training would be able to pass the exam in his particular scope for which he is qualified. After all, the purpose of the test is to determine his qualifications in the field in which he has worked for 4 years.

I hope the previous words are taken in constructive criticism and I would be willing to help formulate pilot exams considering the modern needs. There appears to be no electrical engineers on the Board. Perhaps some help from consulting electrical engineers could be beneficial.

Reply requested before Christmas. Thank you.

The Uniform Examinations Committee of NCEE is investigating ways of preparing better examinations for the use of those State Boards that wish to use them. A most encouraging development is now under consideration and the committee needs your advice.

The Uniform Examinations Committee in its report to NCEE in August (page 105 of 1968 proceedings which was mailed to you last month) reported that the majority of the committee felt that about one half of the first day examination in fundamentals should use an objective test of about 150 to 200 questions and the afternoon part should use the present format with questions that would apply more to the senior level subjects and a test of the applicant's engineering judgment. The E.I.T. committee made similar recommendations in their report (pages 98 & 99).

The Educational Testing Service has been contacted and they are in a position to prepare a 4 hour examination for us for use in 1970 if we can give them the go ahead by Jan. 15, 1969. The committee has tried to estimate the number that might use the examination and the cost per paper will depend on the accuracy of this estimate. Here we need your assistance right away.

The ETS will prepare the 4 hour objective examinations, using a committee selected by NCEE, distributing the exams to your testing centers to your proctor who will supervise your exams. The papers and question booklets will be returned to ETS who will grade them on a computer and report the results to us. The exam questions for the other four hours will be prepared by the Uniform Examinations Committee as in the past and graded either by the central grading service or by your local graders.

Our preliminary estimate is that this procedure, with central grading, will cost about \$9.00 per paper. Using local grading for the afternoon section will only reduce it about \$1.00. The committee recognizes that this increased cost may be a burden on some Boards and in deciding whether or not to accept the ETS proposal this increase must be considered. This is a further step by the committee to prepare better examinations for your use and also to put the service on a sounder long range basis. It will be appreciated if you will give us your estimate, without obligation on the part of your Board to use it, of whether or not your Board would use it and, if so, about how many applicants you would expect to have in April and in December of 1970. The committee would probably shift the April 1970 exam to the third Saturday in April to avoid the conflict with the Graduate Record Examination. The winter examination would remain on the first Saturday in December.

Vill be greatly appreciated. Even though you are not using the examination at the present time, the committee will appreciate it if you will send in the completed questionnaire to assist us in estimating possible future needs beyond 1970.

Architects, Assayers, Engineers, Geologists, Landscape Architects and Land Surveyors

The following Rules and Regulations were adopted on December 13, 1968, by the Board pursuant to authority of Section 32-106, Arizona Revised Statutes, 1956.

RULE I. GENERAL RULES

A. Applications, General

- 1. The Board meets regularly in March, June, September, and December to consider applications for registration. Prior to consideration by the Board each applicant will be required to appear before an Evaluation Committee of the Board at a time and place established by the committee. The applicant will at this time complete the personal audience requirement, outlined in Rule II, E.
- 2. No application will be evaluated by the committee nor presented to the Board for consideration until all of the required information, including transcripts, concerning the application has been received. This includes a standard application form completely filled out, including required signatures on application, photograph, affidavit, and authorization and release.
- 3. A fee of \$25.00 if for Architect, Geologist, Landscape Architect, or Professional Engineer, \$15.00 if for Assayer or Land Surveyor, \$10.00 if for Architect-in-Training, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist-in-Training, or Landscape Architect-in-Training, must accompany the application form. This fee is exclusive of any examination fee.
- 4. It is the applicant's responsibility to secure transcripts of his records from all colleges attended. The applicant must arrange to have these transcripts sent directly from the college registrar to the office of the Board. The applicant's sole responsibility regarding references is that of furnishing a suitable list. The office of the Board will request such information as it deems necessary from the references submitted by the applicant. References submitted by an applicant should include at least three persons registered in the same general field of experience as the applicant and two references who are now, or have been, the applicant's immediate supervisors. Other persons will be evaluated as references only if their responsibility and their ability to evaluate the technical competence of the applicant can be established by the Board.
- 5. Engineers desiring registration in more than one branch must submit a separate application for each branch and pay the regular fee with each application. Registration in engineering will be granted in the major branches of engineering included in the college curricula approved by the Board. Major branches of engineering presently recognized by the Board are: Aeronautical, Agricultural, Chemical, Civil, Electrical, Geological, Geophysical, Highway, Industrial, Mechanical, Metallurgical, Mining, Nuclear, Petroleum, Sanitary, and Structural.

- 6. The Board does not grant registration to residents of other States, except under unusual circumstances, unless they hold registration in the State of their legal residence.
- 7. When an application for registration is denied, the applicant will be so notified. No re-application will be accepted until one year has elapsed from the date of the formal Board action denying the original application. When applications for registration are denied on initial Board action, the following refunds of applications fees will be made: Architect, Engineer, Geologist, or Landscape Architect, \$10.00; Assayer or Land Surveyor, \$5.00.
- 8. Applicants whose applications for registration are denied subsequent to initial Board action will receive no refund of their application fees.
- 9. No application made on any other than a printed form issued by the Board will be accepted or considered by the Board, except that, in the event any printed form issued by the Board does not contain sufficient space for the necessary evidence to be submitted, the applicant may attach additional sheets to said form to any desired extent, but such attached sheets must be of the same size as the printed form and shall be securely attached thereto.
- 10. An applicant may withdraw his application for registration by written request to the Board for approval of such withdrawal. An approved withdrawal is deemed by the Board to be a denial of an application for registration without prejudice and no refund of the application fee will be made.
- 11. An applicant for any of the in-training programs shall, in order to be admitted to the in-training examinations, submit an application to the Board on the prescribed form for approval by the Board. It will be necessary for an applicant to pay the \$10.00 application fee required under Rule I-3 for registration as an Architect-in-Training, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist-in-Training, or Landscape Architect-in-Training, as well as the examination fees stated in Rule II, F.

B. Applications, Special

1. An applicant who applies for Landscape Architectural registration under A.R.S. 32-146 within one year after the effective date of the amended Statutes shall complete all of the standard forms required of other applicants, and will complete the following special form:

Certification to Practice - The applicant shall certify under oath that he is fully conversant with A.R.S. 32-128, A-1, and that the applicant has had at least seven years of practice in landscape architecture, as defined in Section 32-101, as a principal livelihood, of which at least one year shall be represented by such practice in the State of Arizona, as a resident.

C. Experience

1. Qualifying experience, other than time allowed for education, shall in general be limited to that time in which an applicant has been directly employed in a responsible position of a character satisfactory to the Board.

RULE II. EXAMINATIONS

A. General Rules, Applicants for Professional Registration

Initial Examination

1. Applicants for professional registration held for written examination as a result of initial Board action on their original application or re-application will be denied their application for registration and forfeit all application and examination fees if they fail to take the first scheduled written examination following notification of their being held for written examination. However, the Board may waive this rule when an applicant who is unable to take the first scheduled written examination notifies the Board at least ten days prior to the scheduled examination date and requests an extension in writing. Applicants for professional registration held for written examination pursuant to this rule, who have been granted an extension on the first scheduled written examination offered by the Board, shall have their application for registration denied.

Re-examination

- 2. Applicants for professional registration who take the written examination pursuant to Rule II, A-1, and fail to achieve a passing grade will be allowed to re-examine. To be re-examined applicants for professional registration must request re-examination thirty days prior to the next scheduled written examination date, by letter, and pay the scheduled re-examination fee, as listed in Rule II-F, for each part of the examination on which a passing grade was not achieved. Applicants for professional registration who fail to request re-examination and pay the scheduled re-examination fees for two consecutive examination periods shall have their application for professional registration denied.
- 3. Applicants for professional registration who have requested reexamination and paid the scheduled re-examination fee shall forfeit the
 re-examination fee for failure to appear for the re-examination unless excused
 by the office of the Board. A request for an excuse must be directed to the
 office of the Board in writing at least ten days prior to the scheduled
 written examination date. Applicants for professional registration excused
 from a re-examination must appear for the next scheduled written examination
 or his application for professional registration shall be denied.
- 4. The written examination or portions thereof may be waived by the Board when, in the Board's opinion, an applicant has a proven experience record of unusual and comprehensive quality. The Board may require a Comprehensive Oral examination.
- 5. Written examinations for applicants for professional registration as Architect, Assayer, Engineer, Geologist, Landscape Architect, and Land Surveyor will be given twice annually at a time and place designated by the Board; other examinations will be given at a time and place established by the Board. The Board shall select and publish the examination dates and location at least 90 days prior to the date selected.

- B. General Rules, Applicants for Architect-in-Training, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist-in-Training, Landscape Architect-in-Training
- 1. Architect-in-Training, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist-in-Training, and Landscape Architect-in-Training examinations will be given twice annually, at a time and place designated by the Board and concurrently with the written examinations for professional registration. Applications for in-training examinations and certification must be received in the office of the Board at least thirty days prior to the scheduled date of the examination.
- 2. Applicants for Engineer-in-Training, Geologist-in-Training, and Landscape Architect-in-Training will be permitted to take the in-training examination prior to graduation, but in no event will their probationary period start until they have completed the requirements for graduation. Applicants without college degrees desiring to enter the in-training program will be permitted to take the examination prior to the completion of four years of satisfactory experience by submitting an application bearing the approval of a registered engineer, geologist, or landscape architect, respectively, but their probationary period will not begin until the four years of experience satisfactory to the Board requirement has been met. The in-training applicant who is a student pursuing a curricula which will lead to an engineering, geology or landscape architect degree shall have his application blank certified by his dean or major professor.
- 3. Applicants for Architect-in-Training will be permitted to take the Architect-in-Training examination within twelve months after graduation from an accredited architectural school. The graduates from an accredited architectural school must obtain the signature of the Dean of the College of Architecture or their fifth year design professor on their Architect-in-Training application form. Applicants without college degrees from an accredited architectural school desiring to enter the Architect-in-Training program will be permitted to take the examination after four years of architectural training under a registered architect by submitting an application to the Board bearing the approval and signature of the current employer. As a part of the Architect-in-Training program, both the applicant from an accredited architectural school and the applicant without a college degree will be required to obtain through the secretary of the Board at the time of their request for an Architect-in-Training application, an approved Architect-in-Training log book in which will be set forth in detail the applicant's training record. Such log books must be accurately kept and all professional architectural experience vouched for and signed by the applicant's registered architectural employer during the full time of the applicant's required training period. The log will form the applicant's training record and must be filed with the secretary of the Board when applying for his professional registration.
 - 4. Applicants for Architect-in-Training are not permitted re-examination.
- 5. If an Architect-in-Training passes the in-training examination, credit for History and Theory, Structural Design, and Building Equipment will be given him towards his full professional examintion, but, if he fails the in-training examination, no credit will be given and the applicant will have

to wait until his required years of training have been completed, at which time he may apply for professional registration, should he meet all of the requirements.

- 6. If an Engineer-in-Training passes the in-training examination, credit for Fundamentals of Engineering will be given him towards his full professional examination, but, if he fails the in-training examination, no credit will be given.
- Credit for Fundamentals of Engineering will be given to any graduate of an ECPD accredited engineering curriculum.
- 8. If a Geologist-in-Training passes the in-training examination, credit for Basic Geology will be given him towards his full professional examination, but, if he fails the in-training examination, no credit will be given.
- 9. If a Landscape Architect-in-Training passes the in-training examination, credit for History and Theory; Planting, Design and Identification; and Landscape Architectural Design will be given him towards his full professional examination, but, if he fails the in-training examination, no credit will be given.
- 10. Passing an in-training examination will not obligate the Board to accept the applicant for registration as an Architect-in-Training, Engineer-in-Training, Geologist-in-Training, or Landscape Architect-in-Training. It will, however, satisfy the examination requirement should be accepted and so certified.
 - 11. All in-training certificates shall expire eight years after issuance.

C. Context of Written Examinations

- 1. All examinations may contain questions covering the Code of the State Board of Technical Registration and its published Code of Ethics.
- 2. Architect-in-Training--This is a one-part examination of 13 hours duration on which a passing grade of 75% is required in each subsection. The Board need not offer these subsections to the applicant on the same or successive days. The subsections are not divisible parts of the Architect-in-Training examination. The examination will include: History and Theory concerning the development of architecture; the effect of geography, climate and material resources; the factors of site and orientation; the influence of science and technology; the varying response to the needs and desires of the changing social pattern; the evolution of design, methods of construction, structural systems, and building equipment, the influence of tradition and law; typical historical examples. Structural Design concerning the knowledge of various structural systems; when, how and why each would be used; the determination of safe and efficient sizes of structural elements and arrangements of combinations of such elements as slabs, beams, girders, trusses, columns, walls, foundations, and footings, designed in various materials by either graphical or mathematical analysis. Building Equipment concerning principles of design and detail knowledge concerning heating, ventilating, air conditioning,

plumbing, electric wiring, refrigeration, fire protection, and vertical transportation; taking into account scientific, technical, economic and practical factors; also compliance with codes for public health and safety.

- 3. Architecture--This examination will be of 36-hours duration, and will consist of the following parts: (C) History and Theory, the development of architecture; the effect of geography, climate, and material resources, the factors of site and orientation; the influence of science and technology; the varying response to the needs and desires of the changing social pattern; the evolution of design, methods of construction, structural systems and building equipment; the influence of tradition and law; typical historical examples. (D) Site Planning, a short design problem involving a group of public or private buildings of any type, intended to demonstrate the candidate's ability to safeguard the interest of both client and public with respect to land values, obsolescence, traffic; to develope a functional arrangement of buildings and site which will also result in a visually satisfying composition of forms in space. (E) Architectural Design, a specific practical problem involving application of the principles of space design to solution of the program for a building such as might be found in architectural practice. The solution shall be submitted in drawings of specified number, kind, and scale to present an efficient arrangement, logical structural organization, compliance with basic codes for health and safety; also appropriate economy and satisfying aesthetic quality. (F) Building Construction, the use of materials and methods of construction, the selection of appropriate materials and knowledge of how they are combined for use under given conditions, considering their practicality and durability; also the factors of safety, economy, and architectural expression; supervision of construction, detection and correction of defects; sequence of construction operations. (G) Structural Design, the knowledge of various structural systems; when, how, and why each would be used; the determination of safe and efficient sizes of structural elements and arrangements of combinations of such elements as slabs, beams, girders, trusses, columns, walls, foundations, and footings; designed in various materials by either graphical or mathematical analysis. (H) Professional Administration, questions relating to the ethical, legal, and administrative responsibilities of the architect; relationships between architect, owner, and contractor; building arbitration. (I) Building Equipment, principles of design and detailed knowledge concerning heating, ventilating, air conditioning, plumbing, electric wiring, refrigeration, fire protection, and vertical transportation; taking into account scientific, technical, economic and practical factors; also compliance with codes for public health and safety. A passing grade of 75% will be required on each part of the examination. Certified Architects-in-Training will be allowed credit for the following sections of the examination: (C) History and Theory, (G) Structural Design and (I) Building Equipment.
- 4. Assaying-This will be an 8-hour examination which will include questions on fire assaying and gravimetric and volumetric chemical analysis of minerals and mineral products for the more important commercial metals. A passing grade of 70% will be required on the examination.

- 5. Engineer-in-Training--This is a one-part examination of 8 hours duration which will include questions on fundamentals of engineering. A passing grade of 70% will be required on the examination. The Board may, at its discretion, divide the examination into two indivisible subsections which will be given on the same day. The Board may also, at its discretion, accept from the Deans of Engineering at Arizona Universities certification that senior students enrolled in ECPD accredited curricula have satisfactorily passed an examination equivalent to the fundamentals of engineering offered by the Board.
- 6. Professional Engineering--The complete professional engineering examination will consist of four parts with the exception of Structural Engineering, which will consist of six parts. Each part of the examination will be of four hours duration and requires a passing grade of 70% on each part of the examination. Parts I and II of this examination may be required of any applicant for registration as a professional engineer who graduated from an engineering college subsequent to January 1, 1958, except as noted in Rule II, B(7), and of all non-engineering college graduates applying for registration as a professional engineer.

All professional engineering examinations are open book and the applicant may bring any text or reference desired.

The parts of the professional engineering examination are defined as follows:

- Part 1 Fundamentals of Engineering
- Part 2 Fundamentals of Engineering
- Part 3 Engineering Analysis
- Part 4 Engineering Design
- Part 5 Comprehensive Engineering Design
- Part 6 Structural Engineering Design
- 7. Geologist-in-Training--This will be a one-part, 8-hour examination, on which a passing grade of 70% is required. The Board may, at its discretion, divide the examination into two indivisible subsections which will be given on the same day. The examination will consist of questions covering the principles of physical, historical, and structural geology and mineralogy, as well as problems in structural geology.
- 8. Geology--The complete professional examination for geology is of 16-hours duration, consisting of four parts, on which a passing grade of 70% will be required for each part. The parts of the professional geology examination are as follows:
- Part 1 Basic Geology
- Part 2 Basic Geology
- Part 3 Applied Geology
- Part 4 Geological Problems
- 9. Landscape Architect-in-Training--This will be a one-part examination of 19 hours duration on which a passing grade of 75% is required in each subsection. The Board need not offer these examinations on the same or successive days.

The subsections are indivisible parts of the Landscape Architect-in-Training examination. The Landscape Architect-in-Training examination will cover History and Theory (3 hours); Planting, Design and Identification (4 hours); and Landscape Architectural Design (12 hours).

10. Landscape Architecture--The complete professional examination for landscape architecture is of 32 hours duration consisting of six parts on which a passing grade of 75% will be required on each part. The parts of the professional landscape architectural examination and the hours of each are as follows:

Part 1 History and Theory (3 hours)

Part 2 Planting, Design and Identification (4 hours)

Part 3 Landscape Architectural Design (12 hours)

Part 4 Site Planning (5 hours)
Part 5 Construction (4 hours)

Part 6 Professional Administration (4 hours)

- 11. Land Surveying--The land surveying examination will be of 16 hours duration and will consist of four parts which will include questions to determine knowledge of the techniques of land surveying, also knowledge of rules and regulations of land surveying, and laws pertaining to the type of work described in Section 32-101 (12) of the Arizona Revised Statutes. A passing grade of 70% will be required on each part of the examination.
- 12. Examination Rules--The Board will publish prior to each written examination the rules under which the examination will be held for each specific part and will provide the examinee with the questions for the examination and a workbook for all of his submittal.

D. Comprehensive Oral Examination

The applicant for professional registration who has received a waiver of the written examination and a comprehensive oral examination substituted therefor by the appropriate Evaluation Committee, shall personally appear at a time and place indicated by the Board for oral demonstration of his proficiency in the area for which professional registration is applied. The oral examination held by the Board shall be of such duration as necessary to demonstrate the applicant's proficiency.

E. Personal Audience

- 1. A personal audience will be required of all applicants in order to complete professional registration. The personal audience will consist of an oral examination of 15 to 30 minutes and will include questions covering the Code and Rules of the State Board of Technical Registration. The personal audience will be given at a time and place convenient to the Evaluation Committee of the Board.
- No applicant will be granted registration until he has fully satisfied the committee as to his comprehension of the Arizona Revised Statutes and Board regulations.

3. An applicant who fails to appear for a personal audience within six months from the date on which he was first notified to appear shall have his application for registration denied unless this rule is waived by the Board for good cause shown.

F. Fees

The fees, payable in advance, for taking or re-taking the examinations, over and above and exclusive of fees required with the application for registration, shall be as follows:

RULE III. PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

10. PERSONAL AUDIENCE

The Board pursuant to A.R.S. 32-106 has adopted the following definition of terms used in this Chapter.

The definitions enumerated in this Rule shall have full force and effect upon the professional practice of each registrant of this Board.

COMPREHENSIVE ORAL EXAMINATION

The definitions shall be used to determine if a violation exists under A.R.S. 32-128 upon which the Board shall take disciplinary action.

A. A.R.S. 32-101

Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects and Land Surveyors may engage in architectural, engineering, landscape architectural or land surveying practice insofar as such practice is in accord with the custom and tradition of architecture, engineering, landscape architecture and land surveying.

B. A.R.S. 32-141

1. The term "responsible charge of a registrant" within the section defining "Firm or corporate practice" stating that "no firm or corporation shall engage in the practice of architecture, assaying, geology, engineering, landscape architecture, or land surveying umless the work is under the full authority and responsible charge of a registrant, who is also a principal of the firm or officer of the corporation. The name of said registrant shall appear whensoever the firm name is used in the professional practice of the firm or corporation" shall mean that the principal of the firm or officer of the corporation shall reside in Arizona when such firm or corporation maintains an Arizona office or mailing address.

2. The term "the name of said registrant shall appear" within the section defining "firm or corporate practice" stating that "no firm or corporation shall engage in the practice of architecture, assaying, geology, engineering, landscape architecture, or land surveying unless the work is under the full authority and responsible charge of a registrant, who is also a principal of the firm or officer of the corporation. The name of said registrant shall appear whensoever the firm name is used in the professional practice of the firm or corporation" shall mean that the name of said registrant be imprinted on all firm or corporate stationery used in the professional practice of the firm or corporation.

C. A.R.S. 32-146

The term "principal livelihood" as used within the section defining "present landscape architecture requirements" stating that "the Board may certify for registration, any applicant who submits proof acceptable to the Board that the applicant has had at least seven years of practice in landscape architecture, as defined in section 32-101 as a principal livelihood" has reference to an occupation or business on which the applicant chiefly relied during that period for a livelihood and that engrossed most of his time and attention during each year.

RULE IV. SEALS AND IDENTIFYING MARKERS FOR REGISTRANTS

1. Description of Seals

Each person registered under this law must secure and use an embossed circular seal, or rubber stamp, one and one-half (1½) inches in diameter, consisting of two concentric circles, the inner circle to be one and one-eighth (1-1/8) inches in diameter. The upper portion of the annular space between the two circles shall bear whichever of the following phrases is applicable to the registrant: "Registered Architect," or "Registered Professional Engineer" together with the branch of engineering in which registered, "Registered Geologist," "Registered Landscape Architect," "Registered Land Surveyor," or "Registered Assayer." At the bottom of the annular space between the two circles shall appear the inscription "Arizona, U.S.A." The inner circle shall contain the name of the registrant, his registration number, and the words "Date signed."

2. Use of Seals

An imprint of the registrant's valid seal shall appear on each and every sheet of drawings and on the cover and index page of each set of specifications and/or reports or other professional documents prepared by a registrant or his bona fide employee. Superimposed over the imprint of the seal shall be the original signature of the registrant and the date indicated when the seal imprint was signed.

3. Seals, Securing

The registrant shall order his seal through the office of the Board of Technical Registration by paying the cost of manufacturing said seal, and signing an imprint of the seal and affidavit regarding its use for the records of the Board. Seals secured by registrants under prior rules established by the Board shall remain valid. Engineers registered in more than one branch shall secure and use a seal for each branch of engineering in which registration has been granted.

4. Identifying Markers, Securing

Registered Land Surveyors and registered Professional Engineers, when engaged in land surveying, shall secure at their own expense metal rods, pipes, tags, caps or embossed nails which shall show the registrant's Arizona Registration Number as issued by the State Board of Technical Registration and each registration number shall be prefixed by the letters L.S. or P.E., respectively, as the case may be.

5. Use of Identifying Markers

Registered Land Surveyors and registered Professional Engineers, when engaged in land surveying, shall securely attach one identifying marker to every permanent survey point set during the practice of surveying tracts of land for the determination of their correct locations.

RULE V. CERTIFICATIONS

A certificate of registration of such size and form as the Board may approve shall be given to each registrant. Each registrant shall also receive a card on which shall be set forth all of the data that appears on the registrant's certificate of registration. Certificates of registration shall expire on December 31st of each year, and shall be invalid after that date unless renewed by payment of the required renewal fee as defined in A.R.S. 32-127. Receipt by the registrant of a renewal card for the current year shall be evidence that the certificate of registration is valid.

RULE VI. TEMPORARY PERMITS

Temporary permits to practice architecture, assaying, engineering, geology, landscape architecture or land surveying may be issued, covering one project only, for a period not to exceed ninety days to a non-resident holding a valid certificate of registration as an Architect, Assayer, Engineer, Geologist, Landscape Architect or Land Surveyor by another state or territory of the United States who is an applicant for professional registration in Arizona. An applicant desiring a temporary permit shall file with his application for professional registration the prescribed form for a temporary permit. The temporary permit fee is exclusive of any application fee for professional registration.

RULE VII. REVISIONS

Any revisions in the Rules and Regulations adopted by the Board pursuant to the authority of Arizona Revised Statutes of January, 1956, as amended, shall be proposed and discussed at a meeting and, if approved, publication shall be made and a hearing shall be called as required by law for the next regular meeting of the Board, at which time action will be taken.
